**BIG CASINO GOES TO NEW LESSEES**

PROPRIETORS PROMISE ENTERTAINMENT THAT WILL PLEASE AND NOT OFFEND

The Big Casino, Tonopah's popular place of amusement, yesterday changed hands. The lease, which was formerly owned by Ed Uren and Charles Enquist, passed to Al Thackery and Dan Ritchie. The property itself is owned by G. W. Summerfield and the Johnson estate. Mr. Summerfield came here from Winnemucca to approve of the transfer. During the number of years that the Big Casino was conducted by Messrs. Enquist and Uren it was always a popular place of amusement and was conducted in such a manner that no offense was given to anyone. The patrons were protected and all were treated with fairness and courtesy by proprietors and employees. Although a dance hall, the Big Casino is also a place where free entertainment is given that is in no sense objectionable. The new holders of the lease will continue to conduct the Big Casino as it has been in the past and will add new attractions. Both Mr. Thackery and Mr. Ritchie are from Kern county, California, where Mr. Ritchie successfully conducted a hotel. Mr. Thackery ran a dance hall in very satisfactory manner at Rhyolite when the camp was seeing better days. They both extend a cordial invitation to all residents and visitors to drop in at the Big Casino and assure them a cordial welcome and clean entertainment.

**I. W. W.'S PLACED IN RENO PRISON**

SEVEN SUSPICIOUS CHARACTERS WERE ON THEIR WAY TO TONOPAH

Seven unkempt men, all more or less ill, were rounded up in a field just below the cattle bridge at Reno yesterday by the police and taken to the city prison pending an investigation into their presence there, says the Gazette. They had built fires in one corner of the field and all were huddled about the small blazes in an effort to rid themselves of the chills that accompany gripe. Three are members of the Industrial Workers of the World, who say they are on their way to Tonopah. They are not yegg men, according to the chief of police, but are characters who have no right in the city and it is likely they will be given a few hours to leave town. A thorough search failed to bring out a five-cent piece among the seven men. They were rounded up following a complaint made this morning by Joseph Cazenhet, that one of his calves had been butchered last night and the meat taken away. Whether or not the seven men in jail are the butchers has not been ascertained, but the investigations of the police are being conducted along that line.

**FALLS FIFTY FEET IN A MINE**

VIRGINIA CITY, March 5.—Albert Evans, a miner, fell 50 feet down the Mexican mine at 10 o'clock today and was probably fatally injured. His skull was fractured and recovery is doubtful. Drs. Sullivan and Hodgins operated.

**MIDNIGHT MECHANICS STEAL AUTOMATICS**

TONOPAH HARDWARE STORE ENTERED THROUGH A REAR WINDOW

The last properly qualified person to leave the store of the Tonopah Hardware company last night was the manager, Russell Williams. He was engaged working on the books of the concern until midnight, when he carefully locked all entrances to the establishment, but sometime between then and the time of the arrival of the clerks this morning, the place was burglariously entered. The rear window was forced open and the midnight mechanic passed by the cash register, where \$16 could be had as easily as nothing. All he took, so far as the inventory shows, was two Colt's automatic pistols of .32 and .38 calibre respectively. He left finger prints, which were taken by Chief Evans. No arrests have yet been made.

**FULL TEXT OF NEW GAMBLING MEASURE**

PLAYING OTHER THAN SPECIFIED GAMES IS DECLARED A FELONY

Following is the new gambling bill which has been introduced in the senate, being S. B. 140 by Arnold: Section 1. Section 1 of an act entitled "An act prohibiting gambling, providing for the destruction of gambling property, and other matters relating thereto," approved March 24, 1909, is hereby amended so as to read as follows: Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to deal, play, or carry on, open or conduct, in any capacity whatever, any game of faro, monte, roulette, languenet rouge et noir, rondo, tan, fan-tan, seven-and-a-half, twenty-one, hokey-pokey, craps, klon-dyke, five hundred, or any other card game, or any banking or percentage game played with cards, dice, or any device, for money, property, checks, credit, or any representative of value, or any gambling game in which any person keeping, conducting, managing, or permitting the same to be carried on receives, directly or indirectly, any compensation or reward, or any percentage or share of the money or property played, for keeping, running, carrying on, or permitting the said game to be carried on, except draw poker, stud-poker, solo, panguingue, black-jack, and whist, which said six last-mentioned games are hereby made exempt from the provisions of this act when played with the deal alternating; and any person who violates any of the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a felony and upon conviction thereof shall be imprisoned in the state prison for a period of not less than one year nor more than five years. Sec. 2. All acts and parts of acts in conflict with this act are hereby repealed.

**JUDGE AVERILL RULES ON ATTACHMENT CASE**

An opinion was handed down yesterday by Judge Averill in the case of L. E. Clark against Joseph Ploud et al. This was a ruling on a motion to dissolve an attachment. The importance of the point was indicated by the number of authorities cited by his honor in determining his decision. The judge held that the plaintiff must show to the satisfaction of the court that he is entitled to an attachment by such proof as will bring him safely within one or the other or both of the subdivisions of Section 5147 of the Revised Laws. March 12 was set as the date for the hearing and in the meantime the attachment was continued in force.

**STATION COMPLETED IN THE CASH BOY MINE**

The station at the 1350 level of the Cash Boy was completed today and the work of cutting to the footwall will begin tomorrow. It is with ease that the work of holding the water in the twenty-foot sump is conducted by means of a baler. Within three weeks the water in the Victor will be lowered to below the Cash Boy line, which will drain that property.
