CATTLE DIE FROM DRINKING CYANIDE

EIGHT COWS PERISH THIS MORNING, OTHERS KILLED A FEW DAYS AGO

Eight cows were poisoned by cyanide of potassium this morning, their bodies being found in the gully west of town, down which cyanide water escapes occasionally from the tail-ponds of the various mills. Three of the cows belonged to James Woods, four to George Kehoe and one to John Moore. A week or two ago a number of cows died from drinking cyanide water—despite warning notices posted—in the gulch west of Tonopah. When they were found a little calf was nursing from its dead mother.

ELKO DRY FARM IS TO BE KEPT GOING

STATE PLANS TO SELL THIS LAND AS SOON AS BUYER IS FOUND

Plans for making a deficiency appropriation to carry the Elko dry farm along until the 1915 crops can be disposed of and the farm sold were considered yesterday when Gov. Boyle, President Hendrick of the university of Nevada and Dean C. S. Knight of the agricultural college visited the farm, accompanied by a large delegation from Elko. The trip from Elko was made in four automobiles, says the Gazette. Senator Hesson, one of the directors of the farm, was in the party.

Gov. Boyle vetoed the bill appropriating \$8,000 for the dry farm and the visit of yesterday was for the purpose of learning how the property could best be handled to prevent loss to the state. It was thought, President Hendrick said, that it would be best to provide \$1,000 or so to keep the farm in good shape until a buyer could be found.

It had been planned to secure some of the machinery of the Elko farm for the new university farm on the Virginia road, but if any considerable time is taken up in disposing of the Elko farm, or if it is carried along to harvest time the university farm would have to get machinery elsewhere.

MINING SCHOOL TO BE STARTED SOON

DR. LINCOLN WILL ARRIVE MONDAY OR TUESDAY OF NEXT WEEK

A number of students who contemplate enrolling in the proposed school of mines have left their names with the Bonanza and with Assemblyman Schmidt, the author of the bill creating the appropriation. Others who desire to enroll are requested to leave their names at either of the two places, as those who first signify their desire to enter the school will receive first enrollment. Following is a portion of a letter received today by Mr. Schmidt:

"Dr. Lincoln, the head of our mining school, is this week giving lectures in the university of California, but will return on Sunday. I shall send him down to Tonopah either on Monday or Tuesday to meet with the interested parties and gather information as to the type of school that is desired. Just as soon as he has returned and I have conferred with him I shall communicate with you again.

BUSINESS MAN IS IN FAVOR INCORPORATION

DOESN'T SEE WHY COUNTY COMMISSIONERS SHOULD TAKE BURDEN ON THEMSELVES

A prominent property holder and business man of Tonopah, when discussing the Bonanza's proposition to incorporate this city, spoke succinctly and to the point, although not knowing that it was for interview. He said:

"When the vote was taken a few years ago to incorporate Tonopah there arose a peculiar condition. A man was chosen almost unanimously for mayor, while the majority for incorporating was lacking. At that time there were heavy corporate interests opposed to making Tonopah a city. It is understood that these objections have been largely removed in view of the fact that the county commissioners have assumed the powers and prerogatives of city councilmen and have levied taxes and decreed licenses." The taxpayer in question continued:

"If we, the people of Tonopah, are forced to pay toward public improvements and foot other expenses, such as are entailed upon a municipality, we certainly should be permitted to select our own officials. I do not think that the people of Rhyolite, Round Mountain or Manhattan should have any voice in the matter. I do not disparage the efforts of the county commissioners, but I think the system is wrong. Either the people of Tonopah should not be specially taxed or they should have incorporation, so that they may choose the levers and disburers of the public money. I am strongly in favor of incorporation."

PROCLAMATION OF ARBOR DAY MADE

FRIDAY, APRIL 30, SET ASIDE BY THE GOVERNOR AS A HOLIDAY

In compliance with the beneficent provision of our law setting aside one day each year to be observed by fitting exercises in the public schools tending to instill in our youth a proper appreciation of nature's bounties and to promote the universal culture of plants and trees, I, Emmet D. Boyle, governor of the state of Nevada, hereby declare Friday, April 30, 1915, Arbor day, and I urge all to energetically join in participation in the spirit of the day by planting trees, shrubs and flowers in public and private places as a heritage to future generations.

By statute Arbor day is to be observed as a holiday in the public schools only.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the state of Nevada to be affixed. Done at Carson City, this twenty-sixth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fifteen.

country are in commendable degrees possessed of the spirit of the same; that there are many evidences everywhere covering every walk of life to show that this element is doing much to advance the civilization and progress of the negro peoples.

"In fields of journalism we are gratified to bear witness to the growing liberality of a large element of the white press, and are further glad to be able to say that this liberality is not confined to any section of the country.

"In the field of religious effort there has been no time when white Christians showed a higher respect for the great doctrine of the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man than now, a significant result of which is that great material aid, including monetary assistance, is coming up to the help of the man and brother in his upward stride to a nobler and better manhood and womanhood.

"In the field of education we make haste to bear testimony to the great and growing philanthropy which is laying itself upon the educational altar of the race. There is unmistakable evidence that white America is coming to the unalterable opinion that the strength of the nation is not in its armies and navies and embattled cities, but rather in the virtue and intelligence of the people. The law which made the colored man a citizen is being fully recognized; and far-seeing white statesmen and philanthropists, having in mind that the strength of the nation and the perpetuity of our institutions are dependent upon an intelligent electorate and have entered the negro educational field to dispel the darkness caused by the lack of intelligence."
