ITALY NOW SEEMS TO BE ON EVE OF WAR

GOLDFIELD PROPERTIES TO BE OPENED UP WITH DRILLS TO A GREAT DEPTH

Now that the clouds of litigation are dispersing in Goldfield, active steps have been taken to make up for lost time by developing the most promising locations within close radius of the producing district. Arrangements have been perfected with a New York company to enter the field with a complete equipment for the purpose of drilling for ore bodies.

MERGER MINES CASE HEARD TOMORROW

SEATTLE April 13.—The Merger mines case, involving the question of whether the temporary receivership shall be made permanent, will go to trial in the federal court in this city tomorrow afternoon with both sides confident of victory. The hearing will last probably four or five days. It will be bitterly contested through-

out. The court is expected to deny or make the order for receivership permanent on testimony as to whether Wingfield and Clark had capital invested in the Jumbo Extension at the time of the sale of the Velvet claim. This is thought to be the crux of the matter. Further forecast is impossible, counsel refusing to talk before the hearing.

PEACE DELEGATES OFF FOR THE HAGUE

JANE ADDAMS LEADS PARTY TO BRING ABOUT WORLD ARBITRATION

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, April 13.—Forty women delegates to the International Woman's Peace conference, at the Hague, headed by Jane Addams, sailed today for Rotterdam. The peace flag floated at the masthead of the Nordam. Miss Addams said: "I can't guess what a foreign submarine would do if it sighted a new flag, but nevertheless we are secure in our conviction to do what we can for peace."

AMENDED ANSWER IN COUNTY TAX SUIT

ONLY ONE WITNESS ON THE STAND YESTERDAY IN PRECEDENT ESTABLISHING CASE

When the case of the Nevada Telegraph and Telephone company against the County of Nye was called in Judge Averill's court at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, the district attorney asked permission to amend his answer. This was granted and considerable time was occupied before the case could proceed. The only witness examined was F. G. Waterhouse, the manager of the company, and he was on the stand only a short time. The case was then continued until this morning.

GERMAN LINES SEEM TO BE HOLDING WELL, DESPITE HEAVY BATTERING BY THE FORCES OF ALLIED NATIONS

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, April 13.—The German attack on the Russians to the north and near the Prussian frontier has been resumed, and a battle is in progress for the possession of the Russian fortress of Orasowetz. Five independent Austrian armies are operating along the Carpathian front. The Kaiser is supervising the work of the general staff. Heavy fighting is taking place in Bukowina. Two Austrian armored trains were advanced against the Russians. One was blown up. The other withdrew, damaged. "On the highest German authority" Rome has denied the reports that Germany is considering peace negotiations. The Italian military authorities have ordered for their army officers dull metal uniforms and scabbards. This is the measure usually adopted on the eve of war. In the event of mobilization the Italian public schools will be used to house troops, the rent of the buildings to continue through the sessions, women substituting for male teachers if they are called to the colors. If there is a shortage of men the street cars will be operated by women.

HUERTA PLANNING TO MAKE WAR ON CARRANZA

GENERAL IN NEW YORK CITY ATTENDING TO PERSONAL BUSINESS

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, April 13.—Huerta today began attending to his personal business affairs. Despite his assurances to do nothing to violate neutrality, it is reported that conferences will be held to determine whether the time is ripe for Huerta to interfere in Mexico, to rally his old battalions and attempt to put down Carranza. A Carranza representative made the statement that Huerta's destination is Yucatan, where he expects to inaugurate a revolution against Carranza.

ASKS GOVERNMENT TO DOCK WILHELM

GERMAN CRUISER MAY BE OVERHAULED AT NEWPORT NEWS

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, April 13.—The German embassy has transmitted to the state department a request by Captain Thirfelder of the Kron Prinz Wilhelm for permission to have the vessel examined at Newport News to see what repairs are necessary and have the repairs made. The request is similar to that in the case of the Prinz Eitel.

WOMAN POISONS HERSELF AND HER FOUR CHILDREN

SPOKANE, April 13.—The bodies of Mrs. Luther Leonard and her four children were found in her home today. The police said she poisoned her children and herself because of illness.

SHELL BURST OVER AMERICAN CONSULATE

BESIEGERS BEGIN THEIR ATTACK ON THE MATAMORAS TRENCHES

(By Associated Press.) BROWNSVILLE, April 13.—The bombardment of the Matamoros trenches by the Villa besiegers began today. One shell burst over the American consulate. Schools were dismissed in West Brownsville owing to rifle firing in the woods on the Mexican side. The Carranza forces are making sorties.

PRESIDENT NOT COMING TO COAST NEXT JULY

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, April 13.—President Wilson has decided definitely not to accompany Secretary Daniels on his contemplated trip through the Panama canal to San Francisco in July. It was said at the White House today that the question of the president visiting the Panama-Pacific exposition was dependent on the condition of the international situation.

FOOD SITUATION IS GROWING SERIOUS

HOSTILITIES WILL BE RESUMED BETWEEN VILLA AND OBREGON

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, April 13.—Hostilities are expected to be resumed in the vicinity of Celaya and Irapuato between the armies under Villa and Obregon. Each side has about 15,000 men and are reinforcing. The food situation in Acapulco is serious.

EXTENSIVE STORM FOR THIS SEASON

FAIR WEATHER IS FORECAST AFTER THE ELEMENTS GET GOOD AND TIRED

Wind, rain and snow formed a combination today that was unpleasant underfoot, overhead and amidships. While the forecast is for clear weather tonight, at a late writing there were few indications of its arrival. The storm was unusual in the amount of precipitation for this season as well as the cold which preceded. The temperature at 5 o'clock this morning was 25, but this is not a record breaker for April, it having once reached 20 degrees. The high temperature yesterday, preceding the storm, was 70 degrees, but last year in April it reached 73.

LAST SAD RITES FOR ASSEMBLYMAN RUTHERFORD

(By Associated Press.) SACRAMENTO, April 13.—Service was held in the capitol today over the body of Assemblyman Rutherford. The body lay in state. The governor and members of the senate and assembly attended. A legislative escort will accompany the body to Wyandotte.

Disaster in Japanese Mine

(By Associated Press.) TOKIO, April 13.—Two hundred and thirty-six lives were lost in a coal mine near Shimokuni by an explosion and fire.

RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE IN CARPATHIANS IS CHECKED

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, April 13.—An official Vienna dispatch said that the Russian offensive in the Carpathians has been brought to a standstill, and that counter attacks have broken the Russian line in several places.
