NEW MERGER STOPE ADDS TO PRODUCTION

LEDGE NOW MAINTAINS A STEADY AVERAGE OF \$20 A TON

When the new stope on the 1230 level of the Merger mine was started fifty feet west of the winze, it was in a nest of stephanite boulders, giving assays up in the three figures, while the general average of the first breakage was \$60 a ton. Now the vein on its upward direction has become quite uniform and is breaking \$20 to the ton. The vein is strongly matrixed and the walls are well defined. The new stope last week added fifty tons to the production of the property, bringing it up to 200 tons weekly. Meanwhile the other openings in the mine are looking as well as they did a week ago.

ance of being of a high-grade from its deep yellow color. The dark iron makes a splendid contrast to the gold, causing it to show up plainly without the need of a glass.

"The vein is in a contact of slate and porphyry and is said by mining men to be a wonderful find. Where discovered in the bed of the gulch the vein has a slate capping which explains why the many prospectors who have run over the country for many years have passed it by, taking it to be merely a slate dyke.

"The quartz appears to be shot up with pieces of slate, but when panned shows plenty of colors. Already two tons of ore have been sacked and are ready for shipment, taken out of the place where the high values were discovered. The owners intimate that they will drift on the ore toward the south. The width of the high-grade streak in the bottom of the gulch is about ten inches, so far as it has been uncovered, but where it crops on the south end the vein runs from a known ten feet to a possible twenty feet in width.

"On the south of the strike nearly 2,000 feet away, Bray, Walker and Keyworth have discovered ore that seems almost identical in texture with that of the main strike and it shows the free gold without the need of the glass.

"Already there are controversies over claims and it is rumored that a lawsuit has been started, though this could not be verified."

SINKING PUMP FOR VICTOR IS COMING

UNWATERING OF THIS PROPERTY ENABLES OTHER OPERATIONS TO CONTINUE

When it is dry, then developments will be conducted with vigor, the present price of the stock, compared with that of a few months ago, evidencing the faith which the public has in the property and its direction.

YOUNG BAVARIAN DELIGHTS IN WAR

THREE TIMES WOUNDED, HE RETURNS TO RECRUITING OFFICE

(By Associated Press.)

BERLIN, April 13.—From Bohemia comes the story of a young Bavarian who has not had enough of war, notwithstanding that he has been three times wounded and was finally ordered placed on the invalid list. He presented himself at a recruiting office in a Bohemian town as a volunteer for the Austrian army, giving the following account of himself:

He had joined the Babarian army as a volunteer in the first week of the war and received his first wound, a slight one in the arm, in the early fighting in Belgium. After five days in the field hospital he broke away and rejoined his regiment. Soon afterward he was shot through the right arm in one of the battles in France, and had to spend several weeks in a hospital. When he was finally dismissed he went forth determined to avenge his father, who had just fallen in one of the battles in the Vosges mountains. About Christmas he received a bad bayonet wound in the thigh in a battle near Lille, and after he was fairly recovered the surgeons pronounced him unfit for further service. His thirst for battle, however, was not assuaged. He went to Austria and offered himself there, pleading that he was alone in the world now, his father dead and his only sister married, so his life was of no value to anyone. But his pleading was in vain, he was turned away; and the question is now asked whether he will offer himself to the sultan.

PRESTON IS NOW SEEKING PARDON

SLAYER OF RESTAURANT KEEPER AMONG 106 APPLICANTS TO STATE BOARD

M. R. Preston, convicted of murder in the second degree for killing a cook, John Silva, at Goldfield during the labor troubles of 1907, and sentenced to a 25-year term in prison, is now an applicant for full pardon from the board of pardons and parole which is in session at Carson City. His parole a year ago was followed by considerable protest.

In addition to Preston, John Panconer is one of the 106 applicants for parole or pardon. Panconer is the I. W. W. leader who shot a union miner at Tonopah and who was sentenced to a term of 12 to 18 months on conviction of assault with intent to kill.

HIGH-GRADE FOUND ON COMB. FRACTION

LESSEES OPEN OREBODY IN EXTENSION OF VEIN DISCOVERED IN FLORENCE

A discovery that appears to be of great importance has been made lately in the southern part of the Combination Fraction. In ground that is being operated under lease by an association of local mining and business men, says the Goldfield Tribune. The find was made in the north extension of the new Florence vein, discovered only a few months ago and which has been yielding ore of shipping grade in the northern part of the Florence property. At present the face of the drift on this vein, in the Fraction, is showing four feet of ore averaging around \$50 per ton, with two feet of this ore yielding assays up to \$160 per ton and a narrow seam of exceedingly rich material.

From the new workings of the Florence, in this vein, a drift was extended, on the 250-foot level, to the boundary line of the Combination Fraction, where the vein was shown to be strong and of promising character. The lessees have continued this drift, operating through the Florence workings, and at about 60 feet from the line the drift exposed a strong shoot of pay ore which has shown consistent improvement as the drift has advanced.

Near this point is an old lease shaft, about 80 feet in depth, in the bottom of which the early lessees found a strong seam of ore of excellent grade, and from the dip of the vein here it is believed that this is part of the same ore-shoot exposed by the present lessees on the 250-foot level. If this proves to be the case and the ore is continuous, as there is now every reason to believe, the lessees will have over 200 feet of continuous stopping backs. In the Florence, farther south in this vein, the ore found is driving on the 250-foot level was of considerably lower grade and the better ore was penetrated by a raise some 30 feet above the drift, at a point where only low-grade ore appeared in the drift. Superintendent Joe Good is extending the drift on ore and it is planned to start a raise to further determine the extent of the deposit and to facilitate the extraction of the ore for shipment.
