RESTITUTION MUST BE DEMANDED

UNQUESTIONABLY the administration has very delicate, as well as ponderous, questions to consider and problems to solve at present, the one of overweening portent being the attacks upon United States merchantmen by German submarines, torpedo boats and aerial bomb throwers. It is true that this country was warned not to navigate certain seas, but a mad dog also gives its warning and yet it is shot down for its running amuck and attacking innocent pedestrians.

The Bonanza is not a jingoistic publication, but it believes that reprisals should be made for each indignity and injury inflicted on the people of this country or their property, no matter whether the nation to blame is Teuton or ally. Undoubtedly a record is kept of each and every instance, even those that took place in Mexico, and after the world calms down and regains its senses, recompense will be asked. This may easily be adjusted where property damage is inflicted, but in the case of the taking of lives, money cannot fully pay the bill.

President Wilson was asked yesterday to make his words good, with reference to the atrocities committed by Germany. Whether he will or not is a matter of world wide conjecture. Germany, however, is not the sole aggressor. Great Britain has behaved rather nastily in sending American merchantmen to the prize courts. This country will demand from both sides full restitution if it has an administration with a backbone.

INCREASING PROSPERITY

NOBODY can gainsay the fact that the West is experiencing a genuine mining revival of important proportions. This activity in metal producing is not confined to a few favored camps, but extends to every mining district in the Rockies and is daily increasing in volume. Gold, silver, lead, zinc, copper and other mines are being opened and worked with a vim, says the Denver Mining Record.

Right now the West is beginning to feel, in no uncertain fashion, the beneficial effects arising from this mining activity. Money is coming in from all parts of the world for precious and base metals and new capital is thus furnished for investment in western enterprises.

The enlarged demand for equipment and supplies in every line affords evidence of a general business betterment. Manufacturers who were doing only fairly well now report excellent sales; and the foundries and machine shops, so long a prey to unfavorable conditions, are rushed with orders. There is every reason to believe that this gratifying state of affairs is of a permanent nature—and not a mere spurt of transitory character. Steadily increasing prosperity is assured by facts and deductions that cannot be controverted.

PEACE NOW IN SIGHT

PLEASEING it is to note that two of the most powerful mining corporations in this district reached an amicable settlement of their respective contentions at Philadelphia and entered into a vertical sideline agreement. This spells prosperity for both companies and relieves the minds of their shareholders, who had in prospect expensive and long drawn litigation. Two other corporations are still drawn up in battle line, but it is believed that hostilities will soon end and that peace will be restored to Tonopah.

STATE BANK CASE AGAIN UP FOR HEARING

The State Bank and Trust company's troubles are again having a ventilation in the Ormsby county district court before Judge Frank Langan. This time the action is being taken on a petition asking for the approval and confirmation of the receiver's accounts and reports. The matter of the fees, compensation and allowances of the receiver and his attorneys will also be considered.

The depositors of the defunct institution and the state are being represented by Attorney General Thatcher and William Forman of Tonopah and the receiver by Attorneys Green and Herr of Reno. The case will probably take up the attention of the court for the next ten days.

In the investigation today Frank Wildes, receiver, was placed on the stand and is going into his report in detail. It is probable that he will be on the stand for at least a week.—Appeal.

PAYS GOOD PRICE FOR OLD-TIME MINE

A quiet little deal was made in Fallon this week by C. W. Kinney as agent for the historic Hareyman mine near Eagleville which was sold to J. H. Minjar and A. A. Stone of San Francisco. James L. Barron and Hon. Lem Allen were the owners of the property. In the early 60's ore was hauled 12 miles to water and worked by an arrastra.

It is understood the price to be paid for the property by the San Francisco men is \$40,000, and that a good substantial payment is to be made within 90 days. There is sufficient ore blocked out to justify the erection of a ten stamp mill, which the company expects to put in, but in the meantime a force of men will be kept busy blocking out ore.

This property is located about 20 miles southwest of Fairview and 10

miles northeast of Rawhide.—The Churchill County Eagle.

DIRECT CABLE IS LAID FOR GOVERNMENT PURPOSES

(By Associated Press.) ABERDEEN, Scotland, May 5.—It has become known that a direct cable has been laid between England and Russia for governmental purposes. Starting at Peterhead, a seaport on the most easterly side of Aberdeenshire in Scotland, it runs across the North Sea, along the coast of Norway, round the North Cape and into Alexandrovsk in the White Sea. The cable is said to be longer than the Atlantic cable between England and America, and it is said to have been completely laid in eleven days.


