GOOD SHOWING IN FAIRPLAY DISTRICT

F. C. Ehlers returned from the Fairplay mining district last Sunday and reports that quite a number of prominent mining men of this state have made examinations of the leasing properties of the camp in the vicinity of Gilt edge during the past three months, the well known Butler and January properties, owned respectively by Messrs. M. L. Butler and Dungan & Davis, being the objective points of interest, and it is very likely that one of the above named properties will change hands during the present year. The annual assessment work on both properties has disclosed greatly improved values and in width of vein.

The gold values in the January north crosscut about 300 feet north-east of the shaft on the 200 level, are more than three-quarters of the total mineral contents and the quartz shows the gold values distributed very evenly throughout the rock. The last assay taken from three feet of vein returned values in both gold and silver of \$110 to \$121 per ton. Numerous requests for leases have been made but so far none have been granted.

On the Butler property the west drift has been extended 70 feet west of the shaft and the vein shows a face of about three feet of good grade of milling ore with spots and kidneys of high grade ore interspersed. Mr. Butler contemplates installing a No. 3 Cameron pump and a small compressor outfit and drills and sinking 100 feet from the 253 level. The above outlined plans will be started some time during the coming summer if the majority of the large holders of the stock of the company consent.

OLDFIELD'S MECHANIC NOW AT THE FRONT

HARRY BREEN DRIVING A CAR FOR BRITISH STAFF OFFICER

GENERAL HEADQUARTERS of the British Army in France, May 6. -Barney Oldfield's old mechanic, Harry Breen, who has swept around the track with him on the Indianapolis speedway and elsewhere in the United States, is now driving a car for a British staff officer at the front. He says the excitement of being under shell fire has the automobile racing game beaten.

Breen hails from Pittsburg, Pa., where he was born 41 years ago of a Danish mother and British father. The British father was the lever that got Breen into the British army. Leaving a prosperous garage business in Pittsburg, he hurried to England and enlisted. His qualities as expert mechanic and skillful, fearless driver insured instant service at general headquarters, where such men are at a premium. The superb country roads of France, which are kept in a remarkable state of fitness notwithstanding the war, give Breen an opportunity for imagining he is still with Oldfield on the track trying to break a record.

FIFTEEN OUT OF EIGHTY HORSES ARE ACCEPTABLE

A party of horse buyers, in the interest of the French government, spent Wednesday and Thursday in Yerington, seeking animals of the light artillery type, to be employed in the war zone, says the Mason Valley News. The price offered for light artillery horses is \$125; the buyers are, however, working under restrictions that make them particular. Out of about eighty head inspected only fifteen were accepted, the greater number being rejected on one or both points, viz: under five years of age or too long in the legs. The inspection took place at the Pioneer stables, and drew a crowd of spectators. The fifteen animals bought are at the Pioneer stables, awaiting shipping orders. They go to Reno, and there await a train-load shipment east.

BASQUE SHEPHERD LOST IN STORM

Reports from Winnemucca are that a Basque shepherd, Martin Goyeneche, has been lost in the re-

cent snowstorm at Battle Creek, near Battle Mountain, and that although searching parties have been out, no trace of the missing man has been found.

He was in charge of a band of sheep on Beaver creek, and after the storm on April 28th the camp tender, on visiting the camp to locate him, was unable to find a trace of the man, although the sheep were nearby. It is thought that he became lost during the storm and perished.


