HOW MANHATTAN WON THE VICTORY

SPLENDID MARKSMANSHIP DISPLAYED BY BOTH RIFLE CLUBS

The first match between the Manhattan Rifle club and the Tonopah Rifle club was held Sunday afternoon on the Tonopah Rifle range. Shooting was done at three different ranges, 500, 300 and 200 yards. Joe Connor of the Manhattan team started the ball to rolling, making five bullseyes in five shots, which is 25 out of a possible 25—in other words a perfect score. Jack Peck of Tonopah was the next man up and made 24 out of a possible 25. Each member of the team fired five shots from the 500 yard range, and when the score was totaled it showed Manhattan to be 21 in the lead. The 300 range was the next shot from, and when the shots at this range were counted it showed that Tonopah had held their opponents down well, Manhattan leading by only two. They then moved up to the 200 yard range where all shooting had to be offhand. Shortly after the shooting had commenced from this range it was evident that Tonopah was the master of Manhattan at this range, and when the score for the 200-yard range had been totaled it showed that Tonopah was 4 points ahead. Tnta ended the shoot in favor of the Manhattan team, giving it a lead of 21 points, considering all ranges. Upon reviewing the score sheet it was apparent that Manhattan's excellent shooting at the 500 yard range won the contest, for a total of the other two ranges considered separately gave Tonopah a slight lead.

It is generally conceded that the Manhattan Rifle club is composed of men of unusual marksmanship, many of them having qualified as sharpshooters and experts, and the confidence they possessed was apparent, nevertheless, before the shooting was over at the 200 yard range, they saw the handwriting on the wall, and realized for the first time that Tonopah was a real competitor, and would have to be reckoned with in the future.

With few exceptions the shooting was very uniform, particularly so when you consider the trying conditions caused by the strong southeast wind, which blew more fiercely as the shoot progressed.

It was indeed pleasing to note the splendid attendance, and the interest taken by all present.

The banquet which was given at the Mizpah hotel was the end of a great day's sport. The Manhattan boys returned to the Pine Tree camp the next morning feeling delighted over their well earned victory.
