## THE FAITH AND LOYALTY THAT ARE IN US

There was inspiration in a scene witnessed last evening at the principal street intersection in Tonopah, when thousands of people stood with uncovered heads, joining in the national anthem and cheering patriotic oratory, listening intently to the words of the immortal Lincoln and glorying in the state and nation.

Coming as it did at the most crucial moment in the history of the nation—unless it was at the memorable time when the Emancipation Proclamation was signed or when Liberty Bell pealed forth its portentous anthem—the impromptu service was one engaged in with all sincerity and earnestness. A few hours previous the Bonanza had announced the late wire from Washington that the secretary of state had resigned. The reason was hinted at, but not clearly given, and everyone in Tonopah was wondering what it portended, whether or not the rejoinder by the president was to be in the nature of an ultimatum, which in the course of events might be followed by a declaration of war. It was an opportune time to give expression to the loyalty and love of state and country which we all feel, but do not express with sufficient frequentness. The setting could not have been more happily chosen. There we could see the noble banners of state and nation that are to bedeck the superdreadnaught Nevada, flags which are the gift of the state to the nation, beautiful emblems of our patriotism and devotion. Nor were they hailed as tokens of war, but of peace, peace with honor, peace and honor to be preserved by preparedness against attack or to enforce necessary demands from countries that do our nation or humanity a wrong.

No, it was not a jingoistic meeting. It was neither pro-German nor pro-ally. The world war was referred to in vague and comprehensive terms, but the whole motif of the meeting was to give expression to the faith and loyalty that are in us, a reincarnation of our patriotic zeal, and, outlined by the vigilant stars, the mountain crests looked down in the quiet night and bore testimony to the vows reiterated.

## EATING GERMANY TO DEATH

DESPITE assuring statements from Berlin, the fact is apparent that the food supply in Germany is becoming steadily depleted and it will be all the more rapidly diminished when the final reserves, which have been summoned, take the field and cease to be producers. All the allied nations have free use of the seas, except for the risks they run of being submarined, while Germany is receiving no supplies from other lands. Short rations already prevail in portions of that country, where the food supplies are controlled by the government and dealt out grudgingly. Before the end of the year the pinch of starvation will be felt throughout the empire, and men cannot fight on empty stomachs.

It is interesting in this connection to note the rejoicing that goes forth from Berlin whenever the official daily report states that so many thousands of Russians have fallen into the hands of the Teutons. It is becoming apparent that Russia has an ulterior motive in sending its men by the hundreds of thousands into Galicia with seemingly the sole end and aim to get them captured. Germany is now feeding nearly a million of the enemy if the claims of that country are anywhere near accurate. These prisoners of war must be clothed as well as fed and it is a tremendous drain upon a country that has not enough provisions and fabrics for the use of its own people. In other words the Russian plan seems to be to defeat Germany by eating it to death.

## PARSIMONY VS. PATRIOTISM

SIMPLY because considerable money was expended on the Fourth of July celebration last year with, in a few of the details, not adequate returns, there is a disposition on the part of some of the business men to curtail their expenditures this season. This is not the proper view to take of the matter. The committee admits that it got humbugged on two of its undertakings, but that is all the more reason why it should take especial pains this year to avoid blunders and this the committee is really doing. It is composed of hard-working, conscientious, business-like people, who are putting forth their best effort to obtain the most for the money expended. They should not be hampered in their work by scarcity of funds. The celebration, according to the plans now under course of preparation, will be one of the most elaborate and interesting ever happening on the desert, and it will be accomplished at comparatively little cost. This cost, small as it may be, must, however, be met and liberal subscriptions should be forthcoming.

## WILL CREATE A TARIFF EMERGENCY

EVEN Democrats who are at heart free-traders admit that the war has created an emergency condition, and that as a practical matter it must be faced. It is not so much the war as the ending of the war that will cause a tariff emergency in favor of American manufacturers, a tariff higher than the most ardent protectionist ever dreamed. Many lines have ceased to be manufactured in Europe. Other lines which have been manufactured in the past in Germany and Austria cannot reach the United States. Furthermore, ocean freight rates have risen enormously, in some cases as much as 1200 per cent, making a tariff wall which enables the American manufacturer to ignore entirely all foreign competition. When the war ends, this artificial tariff wall will disappear suddenly. This sudden disappearance of an artificial tariff will leave the American manufacturer helpless, and when the war does end there should be a statutory tariff to resist the shock. That will be part of the Republican argument.


