NEVADA LEADS THE PROCESSION

IT WAS not because Nevada appropriated more money than any other state or nation for its mineral exhibit at the Panama-Pacific exposition, nor was it that it had friends at court, nor for any other reason save one that it was yesterday awarded the first prize for its mineral exhibit in all classes and against all other displays, which are assembled at San Francisco from nearly every state in the union and from the four corners of this rectangular globe.

For the sole and only cause that Nevada is the most wonderful mineral region in existence was the award given to this state. It is some years since the cabinet at the state house was kept up in any kind of shape, but even then there were 128 separate and distinct minerals from Nevada's mines exhibited there. From memory a partial list will be attempted: Platinum, gold, silver, copper, tin, lead, zinc, asphaltum, iron, manganese, bismuth, lime, antimony, nickel, soda, natural gas, opals, turquoise, fire clay, aluminum, ochre, tungsten, quicksilver, sulphur, asbestos, salt, niter, borax, barytes, uranium, building stone, pumice, molybdenum, mica, graphite, fluor spar, coal, alum, together with mineral waters heavily charged with curative elements.

Nor does Nevada base its sole claim to mineral pre-eminence on the fact that its products are most varied of any other geographical division on this or any other continent, but it is the chief producer of money metals. Its output of nickel is still of negligible quantity, but of the other three metals used in coinage, gold, silver and copper, its combined production is greater than that of any other state and few nations can approach its total. In still another particular is Nevada unique and that is in the dissemination of its mineral products. In each of the sixteen counties of the state all of the three money metals are mined, while the other mineral products of Nevada are nearly as widespread. Nevada is indeed a mineral empire and it is pleasing to have it so published through the making of this well deserved award.

IF ONLY ONE PER CENT TRUE

WE COMMONLY regard the Japanese as a soulless people, but perhaps that is because we do not understand them. Our impressions may be gained by observation of their evasiveness and covert mental processes. A race cannot be soulless that possesses humanitarian principles. It is but a few years since Japan waged war upon Russia and it was a gentlemen's war. Prisoners were treated with consideration, comfortably clothed, housed and fed, afforded surgical and medical care and strict rules of sanitation were employed.

The forces now engaged in combat in Europe are presumed to represent the highest development of mind, body and soul in the world today, with the exception, of course, of our own nation. Yet if one hundredth part of the allegations made by the allies against the Teutons, or of the Teutons against the allies, be true, then Japan is immeasurably the superior race, at least in humanitarianism. The Bonanza has received a number of official documents from both sides and each of them contains harrowing narrations of barbarism, of cruelty, of even unnamable offenses against printed laws or unwritten laws created by both God and man. Furthermore, neutral observers, even those who seek to gloss over the atrocities committed by either of the combatants, send us presumably unbiased and unexaggerated stories that make the blood for an instant boil and then run like liquid fire through our veins. The horror of it all is unspeakable and induces one to believe that the brutish clashes of mediaeval, ancient and even pre-historic man were most humane in comparison with these annals of fiendish torture and hellish methods of war.

NEWSPAPERS PRINT WHAT CENSORS SEND

PERSONS who complain that American newspapers print incomplete and frequently biased war news should bear in mind that American newspapers can print only such news as they can get—and that war stories are bound to be one-sided and biased, no matter where they come from, says the San Francisco Examiner.

In this war the news channels have been absolutely controlled by London. Even the German and Austrian official war reports must come through London. Naturally, we hear very little laudation of German achievements and a great deal of praise for British achievements. The newspapers never manufacture dispatches. They can print only the stuff they get. And they can get, at present, only what British military censors permit to be sent. We shall hear the true story of this war only after it is over. It is pretty certain that the true story will be very different indeed from the tales upon which the censors have fed us for the past ten months.

PECKS OF JUNE DUST

THE wind blew the dust in the bad man's eye this morning, but that wouldn't have been so regrettable as the fact that it was no respecter of persons, which gives rise to a repetition of the frequently uttered complaint against permitting the streets to remain covered with finely powdered sand, when beneath, hidden, mysterious, is that larva that cost so much and has thus far proven of so little benefit. If sweepers were to be employed and the sprinkling cart put into commission the grocers would have no further excuse for serving sand in the sugar and milady could issue forth in her finery without having it ruined by the flying dust.

PRESENT DAY INDICATIONS

FOR a long time in the early stages of the campaign which resulted in the election of McKinley to the presidency in '96 the indications pointed strongly in the direction of a Democratic victory. It was only in the final sixty days of that memorable contest that the American people came to a full realization of the possible harm that would come to this nation with the defeat of the Republican party and the rejection of the sane, constructive, integrity-preserving program to which it was, as always, so clearly committed.

This time the American people are not waiting until the last month or so to make up their minds on national issues. There hasn't been a day during

the last twelve months that they wouldn't have recorded a vote of confidence in the Republican party, had they been given the chance. As the days go by the disposition to turn the free traders out and fill their places with protectionists increases rather than diminishes in intensity.

Not only that, but they are making their investments and adjusting their business with that very event in view. 
