HOW HOUSE ORGANS SHOULD BE EDITED

FIRST ESSENTIAL IS SAID TO BE TO SEEK THE HOUSE ITSELF

(By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, June 23.—Henry D. Wilson, a magazine man of New York City, at a departmental meeting of the big convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, today gave pointers on the editing of house organs.

"The first essential of a house organ is to sell to the house itself. In other words it should sell to each individual of the firm from the office boy to the chief of the things handled by the house," said Mr. Wilson. He said that it should be so attractive that every employe will want to read it, and will become a critic of it; it should reach the trade on a given date so that the trade will grow to look for it on that date; it should carry light and shade, in order to avoid the characteristics of a catalog, and it should give valuable information on the business involved.

"Make your booklet smoke with selling thought, brightness, timeliness, enthusiasm and absolute honesty of purpose, and it will soon show that it is the best salesman in the shop," continued the speaker. "Occasionally give the other fellow's face or store a look in. It might often be worth while to reproduce the face of his wife, although this is dangerous and sometimes embarrassing."
