PUT TONOPAH ON THE AUTO MAP

THE average number of touring parties passing through Tonopah daily on the coast to coast auto trip is from three to five and this will be greatly augmented later in the season. It is a matter of experiment this year. The parties that are now making the journey over this feeder to the Lincoln highway are really pathfinders. The people of the east, having found the other lines of travel so well advertised and this one so neglected by the good roads and motor journals, feel that they are taking grave risks and subjecting themselves to inconveniences by coming via Ely, Twin Springs, Tonopah and Goldfield.

Those that do hazard this route are loud in its praise. They find that the going is good, the roads direct and dustless, the climatic conditions favorable, the scenery inviting in its weirdness, the supply and repair stations sufficiently close together and the road easy to follow. They will hereafter be advocates for this route. They will tell their friends. They will write communications to the newspapers and magazines.

What will bring this portion of the interocean highway into favor most rapidly will be the little attentions and courtesies we may bestow upon the pilgrim parties this season. Now that Nye county has a good roads association, which seems to have nothing else to do at present, the Bonanza suggests that at its next meeting it appoint a committee to welcome the auto parties, provide them with logs of the highway, show them local places of interest and treat them with all manner of kindnesses and courtesies, which cost little or nothing, but which cause them to ever hold Tonopah in pleasant recollection.

PURE FOOD A BUSINESS ADVANTAGE

DEALERS in meat, milk, vegetables, fruit and other food stuffs should not be forced by municipal legislation to adopt methods of absolute cleanliness and precautions against tainting by heat and pollution by flies during the summer season. The rules of competition should govern dealers. There is competition in all these lines and the purchasing public should make inspection of all the establishments handling these various lines and then do their trading where the laws of sanitation are observed the best. This would soon bring up the standard of food products in this community.

A few years ago a milk inspector was appointed in Reno. Each month he makes inspection of milk herds, dairies, creameries and milk depots. A published report shows the standing of the various purveyors of milk. The grading is on freedom from tuberculosis in the herds, the sanitary conditions prevailing in the milking rooms, the cleanliness of the various processes, the percentage of butter fat in the milk and cream and other details. As a result the milkman who has a score of 70 finds his customers leaving him and buying from the man with a score of 90. The 70 man, knowing that unless he improves his methods and raises the standard of his product, he will be forced out of business, accepts the former alternative and soon he also scores 90 and gets his trade back. The result is that all the dairymen do as well as before, while the public fares immeasurably better.

Inspection, under state law, extends to eating houses as well as dairies. It will be remembered that a Tonopah restaurant for a considerable time held first place in the list in the state and now it is excelled by but one other in immaculateness and sanitary conditions. Other eating houses in Tonopah do not rank so well and it is to their interest to raise their standard without being compelled under the law to do so. In this matter the law of survival of the fittest governs. It should govern also in the lines of business which enter to the kitchen. There need be no ordinances to effect this. The purchasing public should be the law in themselves.

NEVADA DAY AT EXPOSITION

THIS state has every reason to be proud of the honors it has won at the Panama-Pacific exposition in not only mineral but agricultural lines of display. It has another duty to perform and more benefits to gain by having a splendid representation at the Nevada day function to be held in the building next week. Other states are making elaborate preparations for their state celebrations, but Nevada has a distinct advantage in being situated nearer to the exposition than any other commonwealth.

Not only will this be a very pleasant social function and holiday, but it will afford an opportunity to get back some of the cost of erecting the building and making the exhibit in the form of advertising. It is regrettable that Nevada day was fixed for the earlier period of the fair, when there are comparatively few customers in San Francisco, but at all events it will afford a valuable opportunity which should not be left unutilized.

A WARNING TO ALL NEUTRALS

LONGFELLOW'S "Bellfry of Bruges," the many references in song and story to Louvain and other annals of Belgium are sorrowful recollections in view of the desolation which war has caused to that land. The Belgians may rebuild along beautiful and substantial lines, but it will require many centuries to replace the historical landmarks that were leveled by the invading army.

Belgium suffered this terrible loss without sending an ultimatum nor making declaration of war. This should be a grave warning to the triune powers of Denmark, Norway and Sweden, which at times

It is almost a certainty that they would be devastated as were Bruges and Louvain if war should be declared, no matter to which side they would cast their fortunes.
