### WELL ORDERED IN ALL ITS DETAILS

THERE was ample evidence in the celebration of Independence day in Tonopah of complete organization and ample preparedness. It is the experience of all who have witnessed such events that there is the inevitable confusion arising even after the best laid plans. There are bickerings and discontent. Exasperating delays occur. Rivalries develop which are not merely keen but cruel. The best celebrations are those in which these unpleasant conditions are minimized, and such was the one which has just been concluded in Tonopah. Nor was it the result of accident or auspicious circumstances. The executive committee worked for weeks, holding sessions frequently until the midnight hour, canvassing every circumstance that might arise and providing against any possible exigency. The sub-committees were given almost unlimited authority and upon each was placed the burden and responsibility for its particular phase of the celebration. Conscientiously and well did these sub-committees work, each realizing that upon them rested accountability for the execution of their trust. In this connection let it be said that in all the exacting duties that were performed and in all the plans that were laid, there never was the slightest vestige of conflict of ideas or disagreements in the manner of executing them. Every vote taken by the executive committee was a unanimous one. Every word spoken was harmonious. Every act performed was in perfect unison. Much of the success of the celebration was due to the work of the ladies, two in particular who might be named, but there is hesitancy because of the fact that all did so well that it would be cruel to mention two without naming all. The merchants and citizens generally were liberal in their subscriptions and in donation of use of automobiles and free services performed. The Mine Operators' association gave liberally and granted a double holiday in order that all might enjoy the two days' celebration. Everybody did so much and did it so freely that the success of the celebration must be summed up in a few words—harmonious and vigorous co-operation.

### TO PREVENT FLIES FROM BREEDING

A SAFE and effective weapon against the typhoid or house fly has been found in powdered hellebore by scientists of the department of agriculture. Flies lay their eggs chiefly in stable manure. Powdered hellebore mixed with water and sprinkled over the manure will destroy the larvae which are hatched from the eggs. Since powdered hellebore is readily obtainable, this puts in the hands of everyone a remedy for one of the pests that has been found dangerous as well as troublesome. Powdered hellebore, however, will not kill adult flies, which must be swatted or trapped.

It has long been known that flies breed in manure but previous methods of destroying the larvae there by the use of strong chemicals have been open to the objection that the treatment under some conditions lessens the fertilizing value of the manure or actually injures vegetation. This is not true of hellebore. Government experiments have shown that the hellebore is entirely decomposed in the course of the fermentation of the manure and that even in excessive quantities it does no harm except to the larvae it is intended to destroy. Chickens picking in the manure treated with it suffer no ill effects.

One-half pound of powdered hellebore mixed with ten gallons of water is sufficient to kill the larvae in eight bushels, or ten cubic feet, of manure. The manure should be sprinkled carefully over the pile, especial attention being paid to the outer edges. In most places hellebore is obtainable in 100-pound lots at a cost of 11 cents a pound. This makes the cost of the treatment a little less than seven-tenths of a cent per bushel of manure. A liberal estimate of the output of manure is two bushels per day per horse. The money involved is, therefore, trifling in comparison with the benefits to the individual and the community from the practical elimination of the disease-spreading fly.

### NAMES OF BELGIAN STREETS RETAINED

(By Associated Press.) BRUSSELS, July 6.—The question of whether or not to change the names of the principal cities of Belgium from the French to the German has been settled by the governor-general. With but few exceptions the cities, and all of the towns, will officially keep their present nomenclature.

The exceptions include Malines, which is to become Mechelen; Lierre, (to Lier); Tongres, to Tongern; Roulers, to Rousselar; Courtrai, to Kortryk; Alost, to Aalst; and Ypres, to Ypern. Postal cancellations will accordingly be changed to fit the alterations ordered.


