BIG SHOWING IN A MIDWAY LEASE

GOOD ORE ACROSS FELL BREAST DRIFT

VEIN CONTINUES DOWNWARD, WHERE COMPANY WILL PICK IT UP

A most interesting development is taking place in the Midway Consolidated Mining company's property on the 500-foot level at a point 800 feet north of the old shaft. This is in the lease block of Alex Lathron, W. G. Lindsay and Chris Novacovich. They had been following a stringer for some time, when it opened to 18 inches of commercial ore, from which shipments were made. Now it has suddenly widened to four feet, seven inches, and is of better grade than ever, the rock showing ruby and stephanite, while its proportionate gold value is high. There is every indication that it improves with depth but the tributaries cannot go below the floor of this level, the downward continuation of the vein being reserved to work on company account from the new shaft, which is now being rapidly deepened, preparatory to doing lateral work under the old ground, which is now being honeycombed by leasers, nearly a hundred now being engaged in doing development work and extracting ore.

TOM DOBBS HELD SERIOUS CHARGE

HEARING SET FOR SATURDAY MORNING

DEFENDANT CHARGED WITH ASSAULT WITH INTENT TO COMMIT MURDER

Tom Dobbs is out under \$2000 bail awaiting a hearing on the charge of assault with intent to kill. The prosecuting witness goes under the name of Ollie Bell. That is not her real name. She is a Goldfield raised girl, who has been living for some time in a cabin back of the La Chiquita. Dobbs and the girl were both drinking rather heavily on the night of the 5th and about 3:30 in the morning they engaged in a quarrel. Dobbs is alleged to have beat the girl over the head with the butt of a gun until she lost consciousness. Her screams attracted Officer Jack Grant, who placed Dobbs under arrest. Justice Dunsenath fixed the bail at \$2000. The preliminary examination will take place in the justice court at 10 o'clock Saturday morning, it having been deferred on account of the session of the district court. The Bell woman was so severely cut by Dobbs that she was taken to the county hospital, where her wounds were dressed.

NEVADA'S MINING CONDITIONS GOOD

SINCE MAY ALL DISTRICTS HAVE BEEN MORE LIVELY THAN IN YEARS

The United States geological survey has received reports from V. C. Heikes of satisfactory conditions in Nevada that promise well for the 1915 output of metals. Since May the mines and mining districts of Nevada are more lively than they have been in years and more ore is being shipped than for months past. Over 100 cars of ore per month are being shipped from the Yellow Pine district, in Clark county, where nearly every zinc and copper property is working, but zinc producers without contracts for their products are experiencing a hard time selling it at the present high prices. The silver mills at Tonopah are operating at usual capacity, treating about 10,000 tons of ore weekly. On the Comstock lode the pumps of the Mexican and Ophir winzes have lowered the water to the 2700 level. Nothing that has happened on the Comstock in 25 years is of such importance as a vast quantity of virgin ground that has been opened up in the north end mines. Last month the first ore in 30 years was brought up from the 2500 level of the Comstock. Rochester district is equipped with a custom mill, and recently made a second shipment of silver bullion valued at \$26,000 after a run of 16 days. The Nevada Consolidated mill and smelter at Ely are operating at full capacity. A flotation process has been added to its concentrator. At Thompson, the Mason Valley smelter remains idle and nothing is being made public concerning the success of the leaching process on Nevada-Douglas copper ores. The gold production for Nevada will likely not exceed the output of 1913, although greater activity is reported from Seven Troughs and Goldfield districts.

MAD COYOTES NUMEROUS IN NORTHERN HUMBOLDT

T. F. Minor, who came in from Plator this morning, reports that the mad coyotes are evidently rapidly increasing in number. So far as known, there has been no stock bitten during the past ten days. The only case of inoculation known was a dog belonging to Charles Young. It was locked up shortly after being bitten, where it could be observed. It went mad in a short time and died.—Silver State.
