## IGNOBLE METALS IN DEMAND

**M**ONEY metals are less in request since the war started, but their base or useful kindred are demanding increased prices and orders for them are coming from countries neutral and at war alike. The markets are being harvested and gleaned for lead, antimony, zinc, copper, tungsten, quicksilver and allied metals, the last named being by courtesy considered a metal.

Nevada is happily situated as regards deposits of these minerals and all of them occur in Nye county. The Bonanza is pleased to note the arrival today of the first truck load of antimony ore from the Hot Creek deposit, while it is interesting also to read that the lone quicksilver plant is largely augmenting its output and is receiving war prices for its product. There is renewed interest taken in the wolframite stringers near Round Mountain, while in the southern end of this county and just across the border in Inyo, the lead and zinc properties are producing almost a trainload a day.

It is almost certain that the Thompson smelter in Mason valley will shortly resume full blast, which will provide an excellent market for the copper ores which abound in Nye. The Western Ore Purchasing company is being queried regarding the acceptance of all manner of base metal ores, while shipments are being made direct to Selby's and other smelters.

While gold and silver mining is the ideal way, the romantic way, to extract riches from the rocks, the mining of base metals is equally profitable and the deposits are more easily found, because they have been so sadly neglected in the past. With the development of the bituminous deposits at Coaldale, the Bonanza prophesies that it will not be many years before an immense smelting plant, capable of treating all manner of base and precious metal ores, will be established in or near this city.

## WHEN PEACE ARRIVES

**T**HE conditions that will come to hand when peace arrives make a subject of decided interest as well as a field for wide speculation. In a recent financial interview Henry Clews gives the following discussion as to the opportunities that will then be open to America: "When peace arrives reconstruction will follow in vigorous fashion. Europe will be so absorbed in rebuilding, and also so crippled in productive capacity as to have little to sell in the form of merchandise to this country. The disruption of established business conditions, the raising of new tariff walls, the making of new treaties, the overcoming of bitter prejudices and the necessity of making endless new adjustments will all tend to keep our foreign trade in a state of chaos long after peace is established. Our imports will naturally be more affected in volume than exports, because of Europe's inability to sell. Our exports of agricultural products may not be seriously impaired; in fact, we may have to feed Europe while her whole energy is given over to rebuilding; but there will be much less reason for confidence in our ability to win foreign markets for our manufactures a year or two hence than there is now.

"True, new opportunities will be offered, but when fighting is done with, Germany will make an intense effort to recover her lost markets. Low prices, hard work and adaptability will slowly but surely overcome present prejudices. Great Britain will be obliged to make an equally strenuous effort if she expects to hold our newly gained markets. Of our ability to compete with these energetic rivals who will undoubtedly operate on a cheaper and better established basis than ourselves, there is as yet no positive assurance. The whole future of the commercial world is highly unsettled, and all operations connected therewith will have to take into consideration the numerous hazards, as well as the unquestionable opportunities which will arise from the settlement of old troubles and a fresh development of the world's resources."

## MODERN MINING CONDITIONS

**M**INING, in this era of scientific methods and improved mining and milling machinery, has reached a stage in its steady progress where it may rightly be considered a conservative industry, on a par with purely non-speculative undertakings, says the Denver Mining Record. There was a time when this could not truthfully be claimed. In the past the mining industry had much to contend with. Ore treatment methods were crude as compared with those prevailing today and a large percentage of values was lost. Transportation facilities, too, usually were poor and haulage charges were heavy. In fact, practically all costs were higher and gold recoveries much less. Development work was conducted in haphazard fashion, rather than along the carefully planned systems now in vogue.

These deterrent factors have been entirely eliminated, in most cases. A visit to a big producing mine will prove to an observer that mining can be conducted with as much certainty and system as is shown in the operation of a manufacturing enterprise. The management keeps records which show the cost of mining every ton of ore, together with the ultimate net profits. A program of development work, determined by experts after a thorough study of conditions, is put into effect. In all respects the mine is treated as if it were a large manufactory, whose success is entirely dependent upon intelligent management. Many old mines which were unsuccessful in former times have been reopened and transformed into notable profit producers by the use of modern mining methods.




# VISIT THE PANAMA-PACIFIC INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION LIBERTY BELL DAY, JULY 17

Giant Ceremonies to Welcome Liberty Bell. School Children to Strew Flowers Before the Bell. After Trip Across Continent, Priceless Relic of American Liberty will be on Exhibition for Five Days.

## CHAMP CLARK, FAMOUS SPEAKER OF THE NATIONAL HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES IN WASHINGTON WILL BE ORATOR OF THE DAY

Take the Children to See the Bell; Many Schools of the State to be represented; All Railroads Granting Low Round Trip Rates.

The greatest patriotic ceremony in the history of the west will be held in San Francisco on July 17th when the Liberty Bell, priceless relic of American Independence which first

great delegation from Pennsylvania including the Mayor and the members of the select and common councils of Philadelphia. Guards in the quaint uniforms of the soldiers of the Colo

Speaker Champ Clark of the National House of Representatives in Washington, will be the orator of the day and will make the principal address.

The thousands of school children of San Francisco, whose mammoth petition to have the Bell sent here assisted to persuade Pennsylvania to loan its treasure, will also play an important part in the ceremonies. These children will be lined on the parade route along both sides of Van Ness Avenue and provided with American flags and flowers with which to strew the path of the Liberty Bell.
