### A TITLE DIFFICULT TO GAIN AND MAINTAIN

A LEARNED article in a reputable magazine this month is illustrated with a map of the Pacific, the surface of which is included within three circles, the centers being Guam, Honolulu and Hawaii. The radius of each circle is the distance which a warship may easily venture from its base of supplies. When the author of the article used his calipers upon the map he was fondly impressed that he was demonstrating how the United States could become and remain master of the Pacific and hold that ocean against any foreign foe.

If there were a national board of censorship for anything of greater moment than motion pictures, such an article and such a map would not be published, for they give a sense of false security that is more dangerous than unreasoning fear. Admitted that it is very desirable to fortify the three places that occupy the center of these circles, this would not serve to give mastery to the Pacific. It is an ocean that is seeded with volcanic and coral islands, ranging from microscopic proportions to almost continental size. Many powers have protected harbors while as many more as desired may be created overnight. A magazine and commissary at Tonopah, at Reno and at Ely would not serve to prevent the invasion of Nevada, nor would fortifications at Guam, Honolulu and Manila give any great cause for alarm to a Japanese squadron if it should essay to seize the insular possessions of the United States. The range of the guns at the three places to be fortified by this government is practically all the Pacific region that might be deemed impregnable. Unless the navy of the United States is gun for gun and man for man the superior of any force, single or allied, that might be sent against it, the sovereignty of the Pacific is but an idle and a dangerous dream.

### TWO NEW CAMPS THAT ARE MAKING GOOD

EIGHTEEN miles northerly from Tonopah industrious efforts are being put forth by delvers after gold and silver in two camps and a few months old, Sylvanite and Volcano. The claim owners and tributers are asking no grubstakes and selling no stock. The twin camps are not boomers. They are developers. The methods they pursue in mining are such a would govern them if they were in any other line of business. The men in the field shoot, muck and windlass. The silent partners pay for the supplies and meet the payroll for the employed workers. What news comes from the district is guarded as to facts and is untinged with ultra-optimism. 

As a rule they are the most energetic men of their company who could stand detention no longer and who, after passing through the most terrible hardships, often tumble over the line in a state of complete exhaustion. Many of their fellow sufferers are shot on their way. Often they come to the barbed wire fence which has been built all around the frontier to gaze at their prospective freedom with a sudden bullet in their legs or in their back.

Smugglers are making huge sums through dealings in tobacco, matches, salt, and other articles whose export is forbidden by all three countries.

Most of the smugglers are young women, who climb many thousand feet into the passes with their little bundles of goods. The soldiers seldom insist on strict observance of the exportation rules in these cases, and even the officers buy their wares gladly. Young Swiss women are able to sell their 5-cent cigars at a profit of 10 or 15 cents each, although the price is scarcely exorbitant when it is considered that the young women must make a trip of several miles along the most perilous mountain roads and run the risk of being shot as spies in order to reach their market.
