"THE CONSTITUTION OF NEVADA BE DAMNED"

PATRICK A. McCARRAN, senior justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Nevada, knew before he announced his candidacy for election to the United States Senate that such a declaration of intention was contrary to not only the exact text but to the spirit and reason of the Constitution of the State. He knew that his ineligibility would at once be brought to the attention of the voters, so he prepared his defense before taking this step. The Bonanza waited for three days after Judge McCarran's announcement was made in order to give some other newspaper an opportunity to be the first to take cognizance of the glaring defiance of the constitution which this act involved, but the press was either strangely silent or loud in its acclamation of a man who was superior to a mere "scrap of paper."

The Bonanza, it will be remembered, took the initiative five years ago when Justice Sweeney made an identical announcement, and the result was, after the Bonanza had presented the case in the proper light and the other newspapers in the state had joined in the issue, that Mr. Sweeney was ignominiously defeated in the primaries and was thereafter and will continue to be a political corpse. A young man of pleasing personality and excellent attainments poisoned, shot and stabbed his own career when his greed for further political preferment caused him to attempt to render void and of no effect the Constitution which he had taken solemn oath to uphold. Judge McCarran has essayed to follow the Sweeney footsteps to the Sweeney mortuary.

But to revert to the thread of the narrative. It was three days after the unqualified McCarran announcement was made and made in the first person singular that there appeared in the Bonanza an editorial captioned "McCarran's Candidacy Unconstitutional." Published on the afternoon of July 27, this article could not have reached the eye of Judge McCarran, even if he had been in Carson City, before late on the evening of July 28 or on the morning of July 29, but he had already departed by auto on a statewide fence building trip. Yet on the 30th the extended "brief" of the defendant appeared in print in the Carson Appeal. It was given the place of honor on the first page, where it occupied two full columns, and was continued for a column and a half on another page. This "brief" evidenced careful search of laws and decisions for justifying or minimizing cases, doubtless the work of days. The "brief" was headed "As to legality of judicial officers being candidates for United States Senate." The opening paragraph reveals the preparedness of Judge McCarran for the attack, before the announcement was given which made the attack possible. It reads:

"Whether one holding judicial office in Nevada can be a candidate for congressional honors is a question that will be threshed from all angles. The ink on the paper in which Judge McCarran made the announcement of his candidacy had hardly become dry when the Tonopah Bonanza negated the proposition, taking the Nevada statutes for its authority, and probably other papers in the state will take up the Bonanza's line of argument."

That is all very well, except for the fact that the Bonanza did not base its negation upon the Nevada "statutes." It based them upon the Constitution of the State itself, that inviolable document which may not be vandalized by even the supreme court justices, no matter what deprecations they may commit upon the statutes themselves. Judge McCarran did not foresee the line of argument which would back the Bonanza's negation, deeming doubtless that it would attempt to use the statutes and decisions for argument. It is the constitution itself that is the quotable authority, particularly these lines:

Article 6, Section 11: "The justices of the Supreme Court and the district judges shall be ineligible to ANY office, other than a judicial office, DURING THE TERM for which they shall have been elected; and all elections or appointments of any such judges by the people, LEGISLATURE or otherwise, during said period to any office, other than judicial, shall be void."

Later the Bonanza may turn to the statutes themselves for defense of and authority for its negation of the McCarran candidacy, but proposes at this time to rest its case upon the Constitution itself. The oath taken by a supreme court justice to uphold the Constitution of the State of Nevada is a solemn oath. This means that the Constitution shall be defended against attack or misconstruction. The justice who misconstrues it to further his own selfish ends becomes a disgrace to the ermine, a traitor to the State, an enemy to society and in doing so HE COMMITS POLITICAL SUICIDE.

Does Judge McCarran invite the Bonanza, with its untrained legal mind, to extend the controversy by also searching the statutes? It is now doing so. Furthermore, this is not a controversy, it is a defense of the Constitution of the State of Nevada against the machinations of one who would stand upon it, as he would a rotten stump, in order to view and be viewed.

Hold! How is it possible that this almost overlooked paragraph in the McCarran defense could have been inserted? "Section 5, or article 1 of the Constitution of the United States, provides: 'Each house shall be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members.'"

Judge McCarran here publicly declares that the Constitution of the State of Nevada may be damned. He proposes, if nominated and elected, to set the Constitution adrift, as though it were mere idle



verbiage. He would overthrow the rights of the State and seek admission to the upper house of congress by being a party to the violation of not only his oath of office but of the sacred Constitution itself. If in his search of statutes and decisions Justice McCarran has overlooked a section relative to impeachment he is invited to peruse it carefully. It applies very particularly to his own case. If he were to place his finger upon the pulse of a public that is quite irritable when it suspects that somebody is endeavoring to make seorn of its state rights, his honor would have another painful surprise.
