PRESIDENT'S REPLY READY FOR SUBMISSION

Admission That Unusual Conditions Are Prevailing

DEFENSE FIGHTING WITH HEAVY LOSS

Germans Bringing up Reinforcements from Their Battle Front in France

PETROGRAD, August 4.—An official statement claims that continued successful resistance is being made to the efforts of the Germans to cut off Warsaw. There is severe fighting, with heavy losses to both sides.

LONDON, August 4.—Attention is again called to Greece and the part it may play in the war, by a brief dispatch from Athens saying that diplomatic representatives of the allies have been in conference with the Greek premier concerning the political situation.

BERLIN, August 4.—The forces of Prince Leopold of Bavaria are hurling themselves against the fortress defending Warsaw, according to an official statement. The Russians have been thrown from their positions at Blonie, 15 miles west of Warsaw, back onto the outer line of defenses.

RIGA, August 4.—Obeying orders for the removal of government institutions, the state bank has been transferred from Riga to Tula. Other banks are being removed and educational institutions are being transferred to Dorpat.

BURSTING OF DAM CAUSES RUIN

Streets of New York's Suburbs Turned Into Yellow Rivers--Wind Blows a Hurricane

ERIE, Pa., August 4.—With daybreak Erie turned to the task of recovering the bodies of victims of the cloudburst and flood. Fourteen bodies are in the morgue. The flood, following the bursting of the Glenwood dam, swept through a section of Erie a block wide and a mile long, killing at least twenty-five persons and doing damage to property estimated at \$3,000,000.

BUFFALO, August 4.—Traffic between the east and west over both the Lake Shore and Nickel Plate railroads was tied up from the time of the cloudburst until morning. The washouts are unprecedented. The storm which culminated in the cloudburst at Erie, covered northern Pennsylvania and western New York.

NEW YORK, August 4.—The streets of New York suburbs were turned into yellow rivers; surface and elevated traffic was crippled, wires were torn down and trees uprooted in a downpour this morning that broke to the accompaniment of a 60-mile gale.

ERIE, Pa., August 4.—Coroner Hanley has estimated that fifty persons perished in the flood. He made the estimate on the number of persons missing. Police and citizens are searching the great piles of wreckage for the bodies of victims. Many houses were destroyed.

HAITI'S OFFICERS FLEE FROM CAPITAL

CAPE HAITIEN, August 4.—The government officials have fled to Fort-Liberete. Revolutionist troops are beginning to enter the city. Marines have been landed from the United States gunboat Nashville to maintain order.

BOMBARDMENT OF NOGALES HAS STARTED

NOGALES, Ariz., August 4.—Bombardment of Nogales, Sonora, held by Maytorena, has been begun by the Carranza forces. The Carranza guns appeared to be two miles from Nogales.

GERMAN-AMERICANS ENTER PROTEST

SAN FRANCISCO, August 4.—Protests against the "unmoral" traffic in arms and ammunition, the English viewpoint in public opinion on the European war, and criticism of the government's attitude toward Germany were expressed in resolutions adopted by the National German-American Alliance in convention here today.

FOREST FIRE CAUSES DAMAGE TO PROPERTY
