MONTANA LEASE MAKES SHIPMENT

TRIBUTING SYSTEM IS WORKING WELL

THE COMPANY'S COMMONWEALTH PROPERTY MILLED TEN THOUSAND TONS IN PAST MONTH

A shipment of fifty tons of an excellent grade of ore was made yesterday by Messrs. McKay and Gerum, who are leasing in the Montana. Two other sets of tributers have been on the shipping list for some time and two more are about ready with carload lots each, while three or four others are in ore. The leasing system is proving quite profitable to the Montana company and to the men who are working "lays." The success of the latter is indicative that the Montana may shortly resume work on company account, depending, of course, upon the state of the silver market.

TONOPAH EAST END IS AT LAST UNWATERED

SINKING OPERATIONS WILL BE RESUMED IN EASTERN PART OF DISTRICT

For the first time since the Tonopah East End Mining company closed down, which was about three months ago, the miners have had their feet on the bottom of the shaft. The unwatering was completed yesterday and there will be about two days' work on the timbers before actual sinking operations are resumed. Superintendent Cullinan was compelled to suspend operations because of the heavy flow of water and the lack of equipment. During the time that the property was in idleness a complete plant, operated by electricity, was installed. Now it will be a very simple matter to handle the water flow. The shaft is 440 feet deep. Only one shift will be employed at first.

GYPSY QUEEN CUTS STRINGER OF QUARTZ

SHAFT IS BEING CONTINUED THROUGH THE MOTHER TRACHYTE

Despite the fact that the Gypsy Queen was hung up for a day or two this week while repairs were made, almost the usual footage in the shaft was accomplished. The hole is now down 47 feet through the matrix trachyte which was encountered after cutting a strong ledge on its dip. The trachyte contains a number of stringers and the indications are growing more favorable daily for encountering a vein carrying pay values.

LATERAL WORK IN MIDWAY IS BEGUN

RUNNING ON 1300 TO PICK UP VEIN

LEASERS SHIPPING ORE AS FAST AS CUSTOM MILL CAN HANDLE IT

From the 1300-foot station on the new shaft of the Midway Consolidated Mining company, Superintendent Douglas is running a south crosscut for the purpose of picking up a very promising vein which was cut in the shaft. This crosscut is now out a distance of 76 feet. If the dip of the ledge is maintained, it is but a matter of a few days before this ledge is picked up and upon its quality will depend future operation on that level. Meanwhile the sinking of the shaft has been suspended, as it is almost impossible to sink and prospect at the same time under present conditions. The formation in the footwall region of this vein is very promising. The new plant of machinery is working very satisfactorily, permitting rapid work to be done in the development of this property.

There are so many leasers at work above the 500-foot level of the old shaft that it is difficult to keep track of them all. Ore shipments are going out as rapidly as they can be handled in the West End mill and no sooner is the bin emptied of one consignment than another set of tributers is ready to hoist. As the grade of ore that is being extracted is in the neighborhood of \$25 a ton, not only are the leasers averaging better than wages, but a very considerable sum of money is going into the treasury of the company in the form of royalties.

WILL UPRaise TO CUT BODY OF ORE

NEW DEVELOPMENT IN MONARCH

SUPERINTENDENT SMITH WILL WORK FROM TENTH LEVEL TO THE 850

Preparations were begun yesterday to resume work on the 1000 level of the Monarch-Pittsburg mine. A raise will be put up beneath the point where the rich ore was encountered a few months ago on the 850 level. A very good showing was had at this point on the 1000 at the time operations were suspended last year to commence work on the 1100 level.

CASH BOY SHAFT IN GOOD VEIN MATTER

INDICATIONS THAT PAY ORE IS NOT FAR BELOW THE DRILLS AT THIS DEPTH

The Cash Boy shaft today reached a depth of 1425 feet. The bore is passing through very encouraging formation. The bottom is now in ledge matter, with quartz predominating. The continuation of the shaft was started recently at the 1370-foot point, where lateral work showed that it was seemingly on the top of the pay formation. The outlook is pronounced by visitors to be more promising than ever before in the history of the property.

HEAVY WORK IN THE JIM BUTLER

VALUE AND BULK OF ORE SHIPMENTS UNCHANGED

DETAILED ACCOUNT OF WORK IN THE VARIOUS OPENINGS IN THE PROPERTY

A detailed report of the work in progress in the Jim Butler mine shows that mine to be doing a heavy amount of development, with the various stopes and raises looking very much the same as last week, as to both values and ore volumes, while the shipments were practically unchanged. The following work is in progress from the two shafts:

Desert Queen—600 level—614 raise is in 18 inches of low grade ore. Raise 615 is in two feet of low grade ore. Raise 616 is in two feet of fair grade ore.

500 level—South crosscut 504 is going through a fault. Raise 501 is going through a fault to pick up the faulted segment of the south vein. The 500 north crosscut is in trachyte, 502 crosscut, same.

700 level—706 west drift going under fault from which raises will be put up to south vein. Raise 706, west drift going under fault from south branch of south vein. Raise being put up from east drift 705 in three feet of fair grade ore.

800 level—Raise 805 shows eighteen inches low grade ore. This raise is being used to prospect the south branch from the south vein from the eighth level.

900 level—904 west drift is 12 inches of quartz carrying low values. The stopes and raises are very much the same as last week.

Wandering Boy—Second level—350 east drift shows 2 1/2 to 3 feet low grade ore. 351 raise shows 2 1/2 feet of good grade ore.

Fourth level—451 east crosscut in trachyte.

Sixth level—656 southeast crosscut in trachyte with small streaks of quartz carrying values.

Seventh level—708 intermediate west drift encounters fault. Crosscutting south to pick up faulted segment of Fraction vein. East drift from intermediate shows 2 1/2 feet of fair grade ore. No. 4 north crosscut off 700 winze in glassy trachyte. No. 1 east drift off 700 winze shows face of mixed quartz and waste showing low values.

The stopes and raises are very much the same as last week.
