GENERAL PROPERTY TAXATION OPPOSED

IS "UNEFFECTIVE AND UNENFORCEABLE"

ADDRESS BEFORE THE NINTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF TAX ASSOCIATION

(By Associated Press.)

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13.—E. H. Wolcott, member of the Indiana state tax commission, in an address today before the ninth annual conference of the National Tax Association, condemned general property taxation as it exists in some states as "ineffective and unenforceable."

Mr. Wolcott recommended a substitute a "system of classification of certain properties for taxation purposes." He cited the general property tax law of Indiana as one covering "a multitude of sins, the sins of omission," under which "the amount of property that escapes taxation cannot be definitely computed."

"The burden of taxation," he continued, "falls heavily upon those who own real estate or whose personal property is visible or tangible. The result is that each year the rate increases, and this increase causes more sequestration, the more that is hidden, the higher the rates, and so, marching out of step, general property taxation is ineffective, unenforceable and creates disregard and disrespect for all laws."

While there were objections to a classification tax, the speaker advocated as a solution of the problem a law that "should embrace a low rate of income tax for intangible property."

GOVERNOR BOYLE DISCUSSES THRIFT

"AS A NATION WE HAVE SYSTEMATICALLY SQUANDERED OUR RESOURCES"

(Special to the Bonanza.)

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13.—That we have reached a point in our national life when serious consideration must be given to the upbuilding of national thrift, is the opinion of Governor Emmet D. Boyle of Nevada. A special message from the governor was read to the International Congress for Thrift in session at the exposition. The letter, which was one of several from prominent Americans, was greeted with applause when it was read by President S. W. Straus of the American Society for Thrift.

Governor Boyle's message to the thrift workers was in part as follows: "As a nation we have systematically squandered the resources supplied us by nature with such prodigality and with, perhaps, thus far no other influence on our national prosperity than the lowering of our own efficiency, but we have not been fair to the generations yet to come, and the time has arrived when serious consideration must be given to a policy looking to the safeguarding of that which still remains. This will not be done by enactment of laws alone—if it is to succeed it must follow a strong public sentiment in favor of the desired change, and your society has before it the work of molding public opinion in this direction."

"WHEELBARROW KIDS" REACH THEIR GOAL

ARRIVE IN SAN FRANCISCO LONG AHEAD OF DATE OF SCHEDULE

A telegram was received this morning by W. T. Cuddy from his son, John Cuddy, and William Parker, who set out from Tonopah July 15 to trundle a wheelbarrow load of high grade from the mines here to the Panama-Pacific exposition.

The boys reached San Francisco yesterday afternoon, nineteen days ahead of their schedule, even though they spent five days in Reno resting up after their weary hike across the desert. They will receive a substantial prize for making this novel trip, which has done much to advertise Tonopah. The wheelbarrow and the ore will be placed on exhibition in the Nevada building at the fair.

GYPSY QUEEN SHAFT STILL IN TRACHYTE

The shaft of the Gypsy Queen company is now 100 feet below the 1100-foot station. The usual progress in sinking was made during the past week. The formation is still a highly silicified trachyte. The shaft has penetrated this formation for more than 50 feet.

TO PAINT 137 HOUSES

The contract has been awarded to the Joseph E. Stevens company. Mr. Stevens has been getting his crew of workmen together and expects to get busy on the big assignment tomorrow.

FORECAST AUGUST 1ST OF NEVADA 1915 CROPS

The crop report for Nevada on August 1st forecasts a yield of 572,000 bushels of winter wheat; 980,000 bushels of spring wheat; 556,000 bushels of oats; 469,000 bushels of barley; potatoes, 2,040,000 bushels; hay, 762,000 tons; apples, 120,000 bushels. The alfalfa crop condition on August 1st was 89 per cent.
