FOOTWALL NOT YET SHOWING IN THE GYPSY QUEEN LEDGE RECENTLY CUT

Great interest is being manifested in the work that is now in progress in the Gypsy Queen shaft which at the 1300-foot point encountered a ledge in the matrix trachyte. The bore is now through eighteen feet of the quartz and the footwall is not yet in evidence.

HAVE 1500 TONS ORE BLOCKED OUT

PIONEER MINE IS NOW IN GOOD SHAPE

TEN-STAMP MILL IS TREATING THIRTY TONS OF ORE DAILY

After a three-day visit of inspection to the property in the Pioneer district, south of Goldfield, of the Pioneer Consolidated Mines company, of which he is consulting engineer, J. K. Turner has returned to camp. He reports operations at the property proceeding smoothly and attended by highly gratifying results.

The ten-stamp mill of the company has been considerably improved since the resumption of operations about 60 days ago after a shutdown of several months, directly due to a cave-in in which W. J. Tobin, president and general manager, and a miner were injured. The mill is now operating 10 hours a day, reducing 30 tons. The extraction being made is ranging between 75 and 80 per cent.—Goldfield Tribune.
