RUSSIANS REPEAT YESTERDAY'S VICTORY

FIFTEEN THOUSAND PRISONERS TAKEN

Fighting in the Argonne District Expected to Be Hardest in War's Annals

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, Sept. 10.--The Russian victory at Tarnopol has been followed by an effective blow on the Austrians at Trembowla, twenty miles south. Fifteen thousand prisoners were taken in the combined actions, which the Russians were unable to follow up, owing to inferiority of the artillery. The bitterest fighting in the western war zone is expected in the Argonne district within ten days.

TENSE SITUATION

RECALL OF AMBASSADOR DUMBA MAY BE ACCOMPANIED BY IMPORTANT INCIDENTALS

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.--President Wilson's request for the recall of Austrian Ambassador Dumba possibly foreshadows extensions to other Teutonic diplomats. Correspondent Archibald, who is involved as a Dumba messenger, also carried a personal letter from Captain von Papen, the military attache of the German embassy, containing slighting references to American officials. The activities of Austrian Consul General von Neuber and German Ambassador von Bernstorff are also under review by the state department.

(By Associated Press.) BRISTOL, England, Sept. 10.--The Trades Union congress, in session here, representing over three million organized English workmen, rejected by an overwhelming vote a resolution calling upon the labor party to formulate and advocate terms of peace satisfactory to the working classes.

GASES AND FLAMES OVERCOME FRENCH

COUNTER ATTACK TAKES BACK LOST GROUND FROM GERMAN ADVANCE

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, Sept. 10.--The war office announces that the Germans, by the use of asphyxiating shells and flaming liquids, caused the evacuation of some French trenches last night, but a French counter attack resulted in recapturing the lost ground.

COLONEL D. GOODIER ORDERED TO CARPET

CONDUCT ALLEGED TO BE PREJUDICIAL TO MILITARY DISCIPLINE

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.--Lieutenant Colonel Lewis Goodier of San Francisco has been ordered to appear before a general court-martial, for conduct prejudicial to good order and military discipline. He is also accused of interfering with the administration of the aviation school at San Diego. Colonel Goodier's son, Lewis, a captain in the aviation corps, fell recently, breaking both legs. His father insisted that he be brought here for treatment. The charges were made by a captain of the aviation corps at San Diego.

RUSSIA CALLS UPON CHINA FOR LABORERS

(By Associated Press.) MUKDEN, Sept. 10.--Russia is now drawing upon China for laborers to work in its mines and man other industries. Agents of the Russian government have already employed more than five hundred Chinese here to work in the mines in the Caucasus region and it is reported that 12,000 Chinese laborers will be taken to Russia within a short time to replace Russians now in the army.

SLIGHT IMPROVEMENT IN CROP CONDITIONS

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.--A supplementary analysis of crop conditions shows a slight improvement over last month. The composite condition is given as 5.5 per cent above the ten years' average.

EVERYBODY SMILES FOR IT'S PAYDAY

Four Hundred Thousand Dollars Again Poured Out for Local Circulation

Everybody in Tonopah is happy today. Those to whom money is due are receiving it and those who have obligations are discharging them. The monthly payday by the mining and milling companies is almost exactly what it was a month ago, something in the neighborhood of \$400,000 for labor, supplies, power, etc. Last payday there was a detraction due to the fact that two days of vacation had cut down the checks. Today there is a similar falling off by reason that the greater number of the Montenegrins who left for the battle front, cashed time checks before departing. But, at all events, there was a steady stream of men in and out of both banks and there were many people at the receiving tellers' as at the paying tellers' windows. Cashiers of both banks report a number of new accounts opened. All business houses were prepared to cash checks and thus a number of accounts were liquidated without immediate utilization of the banks. The indications are that tonight will be one of the liveliest that Tonopah has experienced in a long time inasmuch as the improvement in the price of silver assures the employment of more men in the camp and an increase in its production.

DAVID FOUNTAIN PAYS THE PENALTY

DEGENERATE TROTS TO THE GALLOWES

MURDERER AND VIOLATOR OF LITTLE GIRL HANGED AT FOLSOM PRISON

(By Associated Press.) SACRAMENTO, Sept. 10.--David Fountain was hanged today in Folsom prison for the murder of 19-year-old Margaret Milling in the basement of the German Lutheran church here in December. Fountain trotted to his place on the gallows. He was pronounced dead in twelve minutes. Fountain was janitor of the church, which the girl visited to make Christmas doll dresses. Fountain hid the body and notified the minister that he had found it hidden there. He was suspected of the crime, arrested, and confessed. He had a long criminal record.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.--General Carranza's reply to the Pan-American conference says that he will agree to any international aspects of the situation, but declines to confer regarding Mexico's internal affairs.

AVIATORS KILLED BY THEIR OWN BOMBS

WHILE MAKING A FORCED DESCENT THEY STRIKE BARBED WIRE ENTANGLEMENT

(By Associated Press.) GENEVA, Sept. 10.--Two French aviators were killed while making a forced descent when their machine struck the barbed wire entanglements, exploding the bombs they carried.

STRANGE PHASES OF DESTRUCTION

ARRAS LEVELED TO THE CELLAR FLOORS

CIRCLING OF GERMAN AIRCRAFT USUALLY THE PRELIMINARY OF BOMBARDMENT

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, Sept. 10.--The comparison made between some of the towns destroyed by war and the ruins of Arras is not applicable to Arras. Here there is no uniformity nor logic in the destruction. In the midst of groups of demolished edifices, houses are found nearly intact. In some cases the devastation began at the top, in others at the bottom, depending upon the point of explosion of the projectile. The population of Arras, which was 26,000 before the war, dropped to 4000 at Christmas, after two and a half months of bombardment, and was only 3000 at Easter. In June there were still 2500 people there, but 850 needy persons, 100 persons suspected of pillaging and about 500 citizens whose presence was not useful have been sent away since. The 1000 persons remaining have been able to justify their presence by some utility to the town. They are obliged to stick to the cellars; they sleep, eat and work there; what business goes on is transacted there. "The fancy goods store is in the cellar." This sign, which has its counterpart in many places, is seen posted on the doorpost of one building. The use of shells emitting suffocating gas when they explode complicates cellar existence, by requiring the stoppage of windows with sacks of moistened sand, yet the spirits of the last thousand are undaunted; their greatest fear seems to be that the authorities will take them away forcibly. German aircraft are regularly circling over the town and their appearance is generally a prelude to bombardment.

BRITISH PATROL HAD AMERICAN COLORS

LAPLAND PASSENGERS TELL OF SINKING OF GERMAN SUBMARINE

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.--Passengers on the Lapland confirmed the London report of the sinking of a German submarine, which was shelling the steamer Nicostan August. A British patrol approached the submarine under an American flag and, raising the British ensign as it attacked, sunk the German.

WILL BE TAKEN TO ENGLAND FOR TRIAL

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Sept. 10.--Ignatius Lincoln, a former member of the British parliament, who admitted that he had become a German spy, has been ordered removed to England to be tried for forgery.

COME TO BORROW A MERE HALF BILLION

Europe Wants Picayanish Sum to Help Finance Work of Self-Annihilation

(By Associated Press.) NEW YORK CITY, Sept. 10.--The Anglo-French commission to adjust the foreign exchange situation arrived today. It is understood that they also are representing Russia. They plan to meet American and Canadian bankers and negotiate a loan of half a billion dollars at 5 per cent. They sailed secretly from England and were conveyed by two cruisers to escape German submarines.

ARABIC AFFAIR MAY GO TO THE HAGUE

It Is Understood That Germany's Reply Is Disappointment to the President

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.--President Wilson spent several hours today considering Germany's note on the Arabic incident. He made no comment, but it is understood that the contents were disappointing. The refusal to acknowledge the obligation of indemnity was unsatisfactory. The United States is willing that The Hague tribunal shall determine the amount of indemnity, but is unwilling to arbitrate the principles involved. An answer is expected shortly.

ARSON RING BLAMED FOR CONFLAGRATIONS

INDUSTRIAL WORKERS OF THE WORLD GIVEN DISCREDIT FOR MANY FIRES

(By Associated Press.) SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10.--Fires causing \$50,000 loss to Sonoma county hop growers are alleged to be the result of an arson ring, which the police believe is composed of malcontent migratory workers in a campaign of destruction as a protest against the continued imprisonment of Ford and Suhr, convicted of killing the district attorney in the Wheatland riots in 1913.

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EXECUTED OFFICER IN SECRET SERVICE

(By Associated Press.) PETROGRAD, Sept. 10.--Colonel Masoyedoff, who has just been executed for his part in a plot to betray military secrets to the enemy, was an officer of the gendarmierie and prominently connected with the famous secret police. He had been a close friend of General Sukhomlinoff, who recommended him highly to the government for use as a confidential agent. The retirement of General Sukhomlinoff was mainly due to his connection with the traitor. All the men associated with Colonel Masoyedoff, according to the Petrograd newspapers, occupied at one time or another responsible posts in the secret police.

ARRESTED YOUTH'S ALIBI GOOD

(By Associated Press.) PROVIDENCE, R. I., Sept. 10.--The alibi offered by Henry Edwards, the Sclituate youth arrested at Worcester, Mass., yesterday in connection with the investigation of the murder of Justice Willis S.
