(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—The navy department will organize all commercial and amateur wireless stations in America, for use in case of emergency. In the event of war every operator will be ordered to "listen in."

"NATION SHOULD BE READY TO DEFEND"

THE PRESIDENT TALKS TO HIS ADVISORY BOARD Secretary Will Send a Note to Great Britain Covering Subject of Trade Interference

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—President Wilson today said to the naval advisory board, headed by Edison: "I believe the nation is convinced that we ought to be prepared not for war, but for defense. Preparation is not a technical matter for the army and navy alone, but is a matter which must have the co-operation of the best brains and knowledge of the country, outside the government service as well as inside. I feel that we should all get together to lend our voluntary aid if only in a spirit of democracy."

SCARLET FEVER MAKES APPEARANCE AT METROPOLIS

Yesterday afternoon Dr. Worden, accompanied by Dr. Olmsted, left for Metropolis to examine all the school children of that district. The home of Mr. and Mrs. Ferrin has been placed under quarantine and every effort will be made by the physicians to stamp out the disease in the shortest possible time.

BULGARIAN CONSUL LEAVES PETROGRAD

BRITISH AND FRENCH MINISTERS MAY BE FORCED TO LEAVE BULGARIA

(By Associated Press.) PETROGRAD, Oct. 6.—M. Kamazyref, the Bulgarian consul, departed last night via Finland. It is reported that many Bulgarians residing in Russia have offered to join the Russian army. It is understood that the British and French ministers will be ordered to leave Bulgaria should Russia sever relations.

AS NARRATED BY THE VERACIOUS BULLETIN

PREMIER VENIZELOS GIVES RESIGNATION Rumania Dispatches Troops to Bulgarian Frontier and Calls on Reserves to Mobilize

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, Oct. 6.—King Constantine of Greece has accepted the resignation of Premier Venizelos and cabinet. He said he was unable to pursue the cabinet's policy favoring the allies. Additional French troops have been landed at Saloniki, where they were cordially received by the people. Athens reports that Rumania is dispatching troops to the Bulgarian frontier, and is fortifying Giurgeva, 40 miles south of Bucharest. Rumania is also transferring all Bulgarian born Rumanian officers into the interior, and is calling out all reserve officers and holding all reserve men in readiness for whatever may develop.

MANHATTAN MINERS SHOT BY BARTENDER

DEL MC FARLAND AND C. CHASE ARE WOUNDED Santucci, the Gunman, Takes to the Tall Timber After he Empties His Revolver

Del McFarland and Carl Chase were shot this morning at 5 o'clock by a bartender in Manhattan, named Santucci. The two men were employed by Wittenberg & Muehst in their lease in the pine tree camp, the former as a shift boss and the latter as a miner. Details are meager, but sufficient was learned over the phone to show that it was an unprovoked attack. The two men had been working all night in the property and were on their way home when the trouble occurred. Dr. McLeod was summoned from Tonopah and Sheriff Slavin also left to apprehend the gun man, who made a hasty exit from the scene after the shooting. McFarland was shot through the left lung, a short distance above the heart, and his chances for recovery are slight. Chase was shot three times, the most serious wound also being in his lungs, but his condition at noon was not as serious as that of McFarland.

BULLET EXTRACTED FROM MAN'S HEART HORSE SHOT UNDER THE KING OF ITALY

PATIENT RECOVERS AFTER A MOST REMARKABLE OPERATION IS PERFORMED

(By Associated Press.) BERLIN, Oct. 6.—The opening of a chamber of the heart and extracting a bullet is reported by Prof. Freund and Dr. Casperson in the current number of the Munich Medical Weekly. The patient was a young soldier who had recovered from a bullet wound through the liver. Upon X-ray examination preceding his discharge from the hospital a foreign object was discerned in the heart. It moved synchronously with the heart's pulsation, and the physicians decided that it was a shrapnel bullet. To prevent possible dangerous complications it was determined to remove the bullet. The breast was opened, the pericardium slit sufficiently to permit the heart to be brought forward, a quick incision was made in the right ventricle and the bullet was immediately found and removed. Much blood was lost, but the bleeding stopped after prompt stitching, and the patient made a complete recovery.
