NORTH IS NORTH AND SOUTH IS SOUTH

THE BONANZA took pleasure in perusing a newspaper handed it by a colored man. It is the leading publication in the United States of the negro race, the New York Age—not the Age edited by George Graham Rice.

It is interesting to note the cleverness of the news stories and the ponderosity of the editorials, as well as the make up, for the mechanical department keeps pace with the front office. Booker T. Washington contributes an extended and very clever article on the situation in Haiti, but that is not of nearly so great interest as the advertisements.

Therein lies a pathos and a tragedy. Nearly all of the extended displays have to do with the furnishing of wigs, the supplying of face pomades, anti-kink combs and applications that will make the hair straight and sliken.

The pathos and the tragedy exist in the fact that the American negro strives to simulate his white brother, forgetting that the north is north and the south is south, and while the twain may meet "at God's great mercy seat," there is a wide demarcation upon earth, and it does not lie in complexion nor in kinkiness or straightness of hair, but is something that dates back into the blue mistiness of history.

The white and black are races distinct. Each possesses its virtues and its shortcomings, but as to amalgamation, that is entirely out of the question and it is foolish on the part of the black people to attempt to bleach their faces or take the kink out of their hair. A black man, who is really and truly black, is a better one than he who has an admixture of white blood, for in nearly every instance this white inter-racial compounding casts a reflection upon one of his maternal ancestors, as well as upon the white man who participated in the admixture of the races. White is white and black is black, but yellow is neither and only sympathy should attach to the inter-racial breed—that is unless he attempts to exercise what he deems to be the prerogatives of his white ancestor.

The negro race is worthy of, entitled to and receives respect from all other races, for it is one that is arising from the depths and is gaining a place in the world, that is educating itself and is a generation removed from serfdom, in which generation much has been accomplished, but there is small sympathy for the negro who seeks to hide her race by using the cosmetics and appliances that are untruthfully stated to be efficacious in making the south north and the black white.

NOT ONE FREE TRADE NATION LEFT

THE frank adherence of the British government to the protectionist principle will not leave one free trade nation in the entire world. Holland and the Scandinavian countries, which once leaned toward the free trade theory, have steadily of late years been abandoning it.


