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THE DAY WE CELEBRATE

NEVADA was admitted into the sisterhood of states on October 31, 1864, just 51 years ago tomorrow. It is little wonder that we should remember and revere the date, for the admission of Nevada was different from that of the enfranchising of other states in the union. It was with a lofty and a patriotic purpose that the people of Nevada proceeded to obtain their constitution. The nation was embattled against itself. Brother was fighting against brother and father was pitted against son.

It was a struggle for national integrity and Nevada territory had within its boundaries strong adherents to the southern cause as well as that of the government. There were schisms and arguments resulting therefrom, Nevada was for a time divided in its sympathies, and then came a great wave of sentiment in favor of the preservation of the integrity of the nation.

Nevada was battleborn. Its very motto proves it: "All for our country." The mines of the Comstock and other producing districts were hurling their wealth upon Washington to have it coined into minted money in order that the currency of the nation should not be depreciated. Even with this flood of silver and gold the metal dollar at the darkest period of the war called for a premium of \$2.85. Without Nevada territory's assistance, it is probable that it would have been vastly further depreciated.

Nevada gave its metal wealth to hold the nation's credit intact, but something more was necessary. There were votes needed in the upper and lower houses of congress for the sustaining of the administration of the country's affairs. That is why Nevada rushed into statehood, for its three votes, the two in the senate and the one in the house, were for the preservation of national integrity. The little state saved the nation. No wonder that it takes pride in the title: "The Battleborn Commonwealth."

AN OPPORTUNITY AND A DUTY

THIS evening the Tonopah Automobile club is billed for revival. If there is an attendance of at least half a hundred members and intending members, there will be assurance that the people of Tonopah are prepared to stand together for mutual benefit. If there are fewer present, the cause will be nearly a hopeless one. The revival of this organization means as much for this camp as the finding of ore in an entirely new locality, and perhaps more.


