THREE FEET OF ORE SHOWS IN NORTH STAR

CROSSCUT BEING RUN TO PICK UP THE MARTHA VEIN AT GREATER DEPTH

In the North Star mine the drift on the 900 intermediate level is now showing from 2 1/2 to 3 feet of ore. Another shipment will be made from the property Saturday. The ore will be worked in the West End mill. This vein is the Martha, the one that paid the first dividend in the camp when it was worked in the Montana property.

On the 950 level a crosscut is being run to pick up the vein at greater depth. Stopping will begin in the near future. The 950 crosscut is making rapid progress and should cut the ore during the coming week.

BUILDING MILL AT HEAD OF SPRING VALLEY

Believing he has sufficient showing at the head of Spring valley to justify a small plant, J. W. Carpenter, associated with Campbell & Kelly of Tonopah, is now putting in a two-stamp Tetrault mill, familiarly known as a Tonopah mill, which will be in operation before the snow flies.

The property in question lies on the slopes of Indian peak of the Humboldt range, a few miles from the camp of Rochester, and shows up a 4-foot vein at a depth of 40 feet, determined by means of a shaft.—Star.

CARLOAD ANTIMONY ORE TO BE SHIPPED

GOLDSMITH HAS ORE IN BELL PROPERTY

AN EXCELLENT SHOWING BEING MADE IN HOLDING NEAR FRAZIER'S WELLS

Julius Goldsmith, who has a lease and bond on the Bell mine near Frazier's wells, seven miles north of this city, is doing extensive work on the property. He has cut from the 70-foot point in the shaft to a ledge that now is reported to show six feet of ore. The assays give returns of better than \$40 to the ton in gold, silver, lead and copper. There are several other properties in the vicinity that are working and have excellent prospects. The ore is base and the values are bunched in the locality, but it is believed that they will be more uniform as greater depth is attained.

ORE OF SPLENDID GRADE BEING TAKEN FROM WINZE AND DRIFT TO START

The Halifax winze is now down 36 feet. It is carrying seven feet of ore from the hanging wall down, the foot wall not being in sight. The values continue to be the same, being extremely good grade.

The cut that was turned off from the crosscut to pick up the vein and drift on it is being continued to the southwest a short distance west of the winze. This working will reach the vein in from 12 to 15 feet farther. The company is preparing to install a small hoist over the winze, as it cannot otherwise be continued to any advantage.

RETURN TO ELKO


