MOCK THANKSGIVING DINNER OUTLINED

INTERESTING MENU PRESENTED BY TEACHER OF DOMESTIC SCIENCE

The domestic science department of the Tonopah public schools offers today to the housewives of Tonopah a mock Thanksgiving dinner menu. If directions are carefully followed your family will be as well satisfied and as well nourished as with the regular expensive Thanksgiving dinner.

A Mock Thanksgiving Dinner
Mock Oyster Soup—Wash, scrape and cut salsify in thin slices crosswise. Put at once into acid acidulated water to prevent discoloration. Cook in boiling salted water until soft; drain and rub through a puree strainer. There should be 1/2 cup of pulp. Scald 4 cups milk with 1 slice onion and 1 stalk celery broken in pieces. Remove onion and celery from milk, add milk to salsify pulp; season with 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 t. pepper, and 1/2 teaspoon celery salt. Bind with 2 tablespoonfuls butter cooked with 2 tablespoonfuls flour. Serve with hot crisp oysterettes.

Mock Duck—Remove the bones from the fore-quarter of lamb, excepting the leg bone and knuckle. This bone must be sawed from the inside end so as to aid in shaping the head of duck. Saw tip of leg bone to form the bill. Fill with stuffing made as for turkey. Sew truss and skewer in shape; trim blade bone to represent tail and insert in thick part of duck; wrap both bill and tail in lard-paper to prevent burning. Place duck in rack in dripping pan, sprinkle with salt, pepper, and dredge with flour. Dispose 3 thin slices of salt pork over the meat and cut 2 slices into cubes and strew over bottom of pan. Roast in hot oven 2 hours, basting every 10 minutes the first hour of cooking; afterwards every 15 minutes; with 1/2 cup butter or dripping melted in 1 cup boiling water; at last basting with liquid in pan. Remove thread, paper and skewers and arrange on hot serving platter. Garnish with French fried sweet potatoes and Parsley.

Mock Mince Pies—Roll 5 common crackers fine; add 1 cup sugar, 1 cup molasses, 1 cup vinegar, 1 cup seeded shredded raisins, 1/4 cup shredded citron, 1/2 cup currants, 1/2 cup butter, 2 well beaten eggs, 1/4 cup brandy and spices to taste. Bake between two crusts.

Mock Plum Pudding—Mix and sift 1 cup granulated corn meal, 1 cup rye meal, 1 cup graham flour, 1/2 tsp. soda and 1 tsp. salt. Add 1/2 cup molasses; mix well and add 3/4 cup seeded raisins, 1/2 cup shredded citron or candied pineapple. Add 2 cups rich sour milk and beat 2 minutes. Turn into well greased molds, filling molds 2/3 full; cover and steam 3 1/2 hours. Remove from molds and serve with brandy or vanilla sauce.

Mock Mayonnaise—Remove pulp from 1 small baked potato; mash and rub through a fine sieve. Add 1 tsp. mustard, 1 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. onion salt, 1 tsp. powdered sugar; add 1 tsp. vinegar and mix thoroughly;

rub again through a fine sieve. Then add drop by drop 3/4 cup olive oil and 2 tpsps. vinegar while beating constantly. If vinegar is very acid use less of it or substitute 1 tpsp. lemon juice for 1 tpsp. vinegar.

Thanksgiving Cake—Eggless, milkless, butterless, 1 pkg. seeded raisins, 1 cup bacon frying or Crisco, 2 cups brown sugar, 2 cups water, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. cloves, 2 tsp. cinnamon, 1/2 tsp. nutmeg. Method: Boil all together 3 minutes and let cool. Then add 4 cups sifted flour, 1 tsp. soda and 1 tsp. baking powder sifted with the flour. Bake 5 minutes in slow oven. 1 pkg. Sultana raisins may be added if more fruit is desired. This is an excellent cake for all times of the year and will keep indefinitely if kept in a closely covered tin box or stone jar.
