W. W. BOOTH IS PUT UNDER ARREST

Editor of Bonanza Is Charged by the "Fearless Four" with Criminal Libel

W. W. Booth, editor and manager of the Tonopah Bonanza, was placed under arrest yesterday afternoon by Sheriff Slavin, charged with felony, to wit criminal libel.

The warrant was issued from Justice Dunsen's court. Mr. Booth appeared on the first warrant with his attorney, William Forman, and asked the court if it wanted bonds.

The district attorney, by name sanders, was present and with his oratorical (?) voice stated to the court that he wanted: "The most severe bond that this court can insist upon."

About 5 o'clock last evening the district attorney, by name sanders, had the editor rearrested on a charge similar to the first and he was released on \$1,000 bonds.
