**FIRST AERO SQUAD OF U. S. TO SOAR**

SIX AEROPLANES WILL MAKE INITIAL TRIP LATTER PART OF MONTH

(By Associated Press.) FORT SILL, Okla., Nov. 19.—The first aero squad of the United States army, designed for use in the field in connection with troop operations, will fly from its temporary station at Fort Sill to its permanent home in San Antonio, Texas, the latter part of this month. Six aeroplanes will make the flight, the first of its kind in this country.

The "aero" or officially the "automatic survey camera" will be a part of the equipment of the machines, and will take pictures of the country over which the flight is made. These pictures can be made ready instantly upon landing and give a whole connected series of views to which a scale can be applied and from which ranges may be ascertained. When desired, a telephoto lens may be attached to the camera, searching the ground for evidences of troops and batteries invisible to the naked eye.

The aerial journey will be made under conditions as nearly like those encountered in actual war as possible. The start is planned for November 20, barring bad weather and the distance to be covered is 450 miles. Stops will be made at Wichita Falls, Bowie, DeSoto, Fort Worth, Cleburne, Hillsboro, Waco, Georgetown, Austin and possibly at Granger and Temple, Tex. Trucks following the machines must average eighty miles a day. One truck for supplies and equipment will be assigned to each aeroplane, and there will also be a machine shop truck. Six motorcycles carrying quick repair kits will go along, for emergency service.

The first aero squadron, signal corps, U. S. A., is the official designation of the flying unit. The squadron is divided into six flying sections, a transport section, a supply section, an engineer section and a headquarters section. The officers are Captain B.

D. Fulois commanding, and Lieutenants T. D. Milling, C. G. Chapman, J. F. Carberry, T. S. Bowen and I. A. Raders. Captain Fulois is the oldest military flyer in the United States, in point of service. With Orville Wright he completed the first cross-country flight made by a military aeroplane. This was made at Fort Myer, Va., in 1908.

**MURDERED CHINAMAN LEFT AN ESTATE**

The Chinaman who was murdered at the McIntyre ranch on the evening of November 6th left an estate consisting of several hundred dollars in an Elko bank, besides a stock of goods carried by himself for sale to the cowboys. It is said that Kim was really wealthy and that he owned a flourishing business in San Francisco. A petition was filed in the district court by H. U. Castle asking that letters of administration be issued to him, the only relatives known being a wife and children in China.—Elko Free Press.

**HARRY SAVAGE, FORMER COM. STOCKER, AMONG MISSING**

The San Francisco Examiner states that "for more than ten days police and private detectives have scoured the city vainly trying to find some trace of Harry Savage the young man who disappeared mysteriously on November 1. Detective Bakulich yesterday said he has exhausted every resource and that the disappearance is as puzzling as it was to begin with. Savage's mother is on the point of a collapse. Circulars bearing the boy's picture have been sent broadcast over the state. At the time he was last seen he had \$30 in his pockets.

**WILL BE CARRIED TO HIGHEST COURT**

A writ of error to the Supreme court of the United States has been granted in the case of the state against the attorneys for Wells Fargo. The order granting the writ was signed by Chief Justice Norcross and has been forwarded to Washington, where it will be entered on the Supreme court docket, says the Carson News.

It is probable that the case will not come up for argument before the Supreme court of the United States before the next October term.

The suit will be a test of the constitutionality of the state law taxing the right of the express company to do business in this state. The amount due in taxes, claimed by Humboldt county, is \$694.53. The District court Judge E. A. Ducker presiding, held that the taxes were legally collectable and the Supreme court of the state in a long opinion written by Chief Justice Norcross, sustained the District court.

**PRESERVING MANUSCRIPT JUDGE GOODWIN'S ADDRESS**

Miss Jeanette Wier, the curator of the Nevada Historical Society, has received the manuscript of the address delivered by Judge Goodwin at Carson City last Fourth of July and she suggests that there must be many more manuscripts of interest in the possession of private persons, says the Gazette. The interment was in the Catholic plot of the Tonopah cemetery. A large number of friends accompanied the body to the grave. Mrs. O'Neil wired from Portland, Oregon, that she is ill and unable to come for the funeral.
