FLOTATION TEST PLANT FOR CONSOLIDATED

GOLDFIELD COMPANY WILL TRY PROCESS ON ITS DEEP-LEVEL ORES

Successful laboratory tests to determine the efficacy of oil flotation in the treatment of the copper-bearing ores of the Goldfield district, have led to a decision on the part of the management of the Goldfield Consolidated Mines company to proceed at once with the installation of equipment for a 30-ton unit for experimenting on a large scale with this process, says the Tribune. Flotation is proving to be a complete success in a number of districts the ore of which is refractory, and metallurgists now regard it as the coming universal process for the treatment of ores that are not amenable to cyanidation. The deep-level ores of the Goldfield district, for the most part, contain copper and other base elements that render them unsuited to treatment by any milling process employed in this region, and a great part of this ore will not bear the high cost of transportation to smelting points. In several of the Goldfield mines, in which development has reached an advanced stage, large quantities of ore of this character have been exposed, notably in the Mohawk, Red Top, Laguna, Grizzly Bear, Claremont, Jumbo Extension and Atlanta mines, and good authorities declare that the tonnage now available is of sufficient volume to insure a supply for a long period, to a plant of large capacity.

THE SUNSET MILL IS BEING IMPROVED

The Sunset Mining and Development company, operating the old Tramps Consolidated property at Rhyolite, is making improvements in its mill that are designed to increase its capacity, says the Goldfield Tribune. The principal new equipment will consist of a Dorr duplex classifier and a Hardinger ball mill. Some accessory equipment will also be installed. The classifier is now on the ground and concrete foundations for the ball mill are being built. The additions to the equipment will be completely installed and in operation by January 1 and will increase the milling capacity of the plant to approximately 100 tons per day.
