**MEN AND MICE**

NO matter whether the Bonanza is sued or arrested, whether attached or made defendant in a misdemeanor or a criminal action, it desires at this time to state and to reiterate and repeat and emphasize that its position is unaltered. It has stood, it stands and it will stand firmly and fearlessly in opposition to the wasting of public funds, the extravagant rate of taxation and the prodigality in the use of county money. **OF INTEREST AND PROFIT**

PRESIDENT Hendrick is planning a course of lectures by practical mining men in Nevada to be delivered at the state university. Such a series would prove of intense interest and incalculable benefit, provided the right people are secured. There are in Nevada some of the most learned men in the mining science and most skilled in its application as are to be found in the world today.

Their addresses would be well worth traveling many miles to hear and they should be published and scattered broadcast. The only difficulty will be in securing the best men for this series. They are usually either too modest or too busy to take the lecture platform, but as this is for the good of the youth of the state, and the adults as well, it is to be hoped that President Hendrick's persuasive powers will prevail.

**UTAH'S GOVERNOR TAKES STAND**

GOVERNOR Spry of Utah has announced that his policy, aim and effort in the future will be to rid the state forever of the Industrial Workers of the World. He and his family have been threatened with death and the trouble makers have also announced that they would dynamite the capitol building. Governor Spry has thus far maintained a firm stand. He did grant a reprieve to Hillstrom at the urgent request by the president, even though the federal government had no right to intervene in a case where state authority governs. He, however, did not obey the second request and the law took its course, the penalty of its infraction being exacted. Hillstrom is dead, the governor and his family still live and the state capitol building has not yet been dynamited. Governor Spry is on the job.

**INTENSIVE PROSPECTING**

PROSPECTING for metals in Nevada, particularly in the southern part of the state, is becoming far more intensive in the matter of securing a wider variety of metals and is no longer conducted in the haphazard manner of former days, when gold in the pan was the only indication accepted by the prospector of the presence of anything of value, says the Goldfield Tribune. Metals and mineral substances of great variety are now being sought throughout this region and the prospector or claim owner who has the slightest vestige of a mineral showing to exploit can readily interest some of the most important mining corporations or individual operators, at least to the extent of sending competent experts to examine and report upon such discoveries.

**THE CHIEF OBSTACLE**

THE chief obstacle encountered by dye manufacturers in this country is an unfavorable and uncertain tariff policy. There is no dearth of technical skill nor ability to produce dyes in the United States, but there is much unwillingness to invest large capital in the necessary equipment to promote an enterprise so very uncertain in its outcome.

Without adequate tariff protection it will be impossible to establish a dye industry in this country and nourish it to such estate that it will be able successfully to compete with the leading European producers. Without a continuing tariff policy manufacturers will not be justified in investing capital in the new business, since at any time support may be withdrawn and the industry left to its fate. It is, in fact, this latter phase of the question which occasions manufacturers the greatest worry. An unfavorable tariff policy which is certain is better than a favorable one which may be changed at any moment.

No amount of agitation on the part of representatives of the Department of Commerce can change these facts.

**HOW THE WAR WILL END**

ANDREW Carnegie in his remarks yesterday, on the occasion of the anniversary of his birth, expressed the confident opinion that the world would soon see peace and that it would be permanent through the influence of a world court.

While this is a pleasing outlook, it seems to be entirely too optimistic. Peace will come and before long. It will come through the lack of money and credit by the warring powers, rather than in the slaughter and capture of their men, although the loss to the latter is appalling, running well up into the millions. The nations are wasting away financially. It is said that Russia has only one-third of its soldiers fully armed and equipped. Germany is resorting to many hitherto undreamed of tactics to continue the manufacture of ammunition. France and England are at their wits' ends for funds. Japan is unable to transport its troops to the seat of war. Serbia has the death rattle in its throat.

The end of the war approaches, but it is a bitter end, one of lying prone and begging for quarter, from an enemy that has not the power to enforce its demands, with neither men, money nor supplies to pluck the fruits of victory.
