**ROSEATE OUTLOOK FOR TONOPAH**

There is no question that heavy interests are becoming identified with the outlying properties of Tonopah district. Much mystery still attaches to some of the recent deals that have been consummated, while others are directly traceable to a strong crowd of capitalists. These developments are indicative that heavy work will be undertaken and that the productivity of Tonopah is but in the period of its infancy.

**WHERE "FUL" IS A MISNOMER**

General Fumson is reported to be in full command at the scene of the recent fight on the Mexican border. But is not the word "full" inaccurately applied? If the doughty little general were to have his hands untied by Washington, he would quickly pacify the border, for the boys in khaki are straining at the leash.

**OUTLOOK IS EXCELLENT**

Meteorological conditions for this section of Nevada are extremely favorable this year. Perusal of the records of the local observation station of the weather bureau show that there is little variance in the total precipitation from year to year. This summer and autumn have been almost without rainfall, only a trace having been registered in two months.

This would seem to indicate that the snowfall will be heavy. The moisture that comes before freezing weather does much less good to the ranges than later, when it is retained and there is less loss through evaporation. The stock men are confident that they will be amply supplied for next season.

**IS BUSINESS SENTIMENT SO GUILTESS?**

"Business sentiment," says a writer in the financial column of a New York paper, "seems to be crystallizing in favor of a permanent tariff commission, composed of experts and free from political influence. Business sentiment, in that case, must be singularly guileless and lacking in common sense. The absurdity of a tariff commission 'composed of experts and free from political influence' becomes apparent the moment one inquires where such a body would be found or how it would be created. Our government is a party government, and so long as it remains so its various agencies will be more or less under political influences. The country has had one tariff commission, but the lesson of the experiment seems to have been forgotten. President Taft appointed a body of experts, composed of the most capable men he could secure, which made an exhaustive study of certain tariff schedules. Its reports had no influence whatever on Congress. Democrats attacked the motives of the experts, disputed their facts and condemned their conclusions. Any agency that congress might appoint would undoubtedly receive similar treatment in connection with any future revision of the tariff.

**THE STATUS OF GREECE**

Really Greece is almost as worthy of sympathy as poor, desolated Belgium and devastated Serbia. We read every day of the harassing of the ancient empire by the allied powers, which have brought incalculably heavy pressure on that little nation to have it enter the lists with them. We read also that the king has steadfastly resisted the approaches.

Greece has no axes to grind, no chestnuts to pull. It is content to remain at peace with the world and to till its soil and pursue its vocations unmolested and unmolested. It has an ancient grievance, of course, against Turkey, but Turkey itself did not enter the war of its own volition. It also was beseeched and commanded. Thus far Greece has been successful in maintaining its neutrality, even though it has made concessions which were unreasonable and may place it in the position later that Belgium was in when the war began.

Only two nations have a grievance in this war, England and Germany. They are each striving for commercial supremacy and in so doing they are not merely wearing themselves out, but have brought incalculable suffering to the remainder of Europe.

**WAR EFFECTS MINING COSTS**

Owing to the increased cost of chemicals, brought about by the war, the mining companies will be obliged to pay more than heretofore for the explosives that they use. These advances range from 20 to 50 per cent, with no apparent prospects of a decrease for a long time to come, says the Denver Mining Record.

Practically every industry pays its toll to the war in one form or another, yet each usually reaps a larger gain in return. This is particularly true of the mining business. While the cost of explosives and some other mining necessities have been advanced by the war, the producers of metal are generally receiving much higher prices for their products than prevail in times of peace. Even silver is showing signs of a betterment, as the quotations of the last few days clearly indicate.

The mining companies, as a whole, are in such a flourishing condition that they are well able to stand a considerable increase in the cost of development work, much as they may dislike to pay a fancy price for their supplies. So long as a large margin of profit remains over the cost of production, the producers will continue to be happy and not worry over the outlay of a few extra dollars.
