INTERVENTION GRANTED IN BANK CASE

Judge Frank H. Langan, sitting in the fifth judicial district court in Tonopah today, in the case of the First National Bank of San Francisco against Nye county, granted the petition for intervention filed by E. O. Patterson, receiver of the Nye & Ormsby County Bank.

Mr. Patterson alleged in his complaint that on December 23, 1907, the Nye & Ormsby County Bank gave a note for \$100,000 to the First National

Bank of San Francisco and on March 5, 1908, gave an additional note for \$50,000. Each of these notes was endorsed by Frank Golden, the president of the Nye & Ormsby County Bank.

It is alleged by Mr. Patterson that it was known to a certainty by the parties to the transaction that the

Nye & Ormsby County Bank was insolvent. Mr. Patterson alleges that the First National Bank of San Francisco received from the Nye & Ormsby County Bank, through Mr. Golden, securities valued at \$350,000 as security for the money borrowed.

It is further alleged that the San Francisco bank realized about \$250,000 from the sale of a portion of these securities. Among these were Nye county notes, worth \$25,000 with accumulated interest.

Mr. Patterson alleges that these securities were all taken by the First National bank at a time when the Nye & Ormsby County Bank was known to be insolvent, and that these securities should belong pro rata to the creditors of the institution.
