J. V. ENKHOUSE MAY GO TO PRISON FOR TERM OF FOURTEEN YEARS

The jury in the case of J. F. Enkhouse of Rochester, on trial for mayhem, returned a verdict at 11:30 yesterday, finding the defendant guilty as charged.

Enkhouse was remanded to the county jail and next Thursday at 10 a. m. was the time set for pronouncing sentence. The maximum punishment is fourteen years in state prison.

REFERENDUM VOTING IS STARTED TODAY

present rates. The demands pertain only to freight and not to passenger service. The propositions on which the men voted were divided under four articles. The first pertained to road service and provided that 100 miles or less, or eight hours or less shall constitute a day, with overtime beginning at the expiration of eight hours on runs less than 100 miles, and as soon as 100 miles have been run on longer trips, overtime to be computed at one and one-half times the prorate rate, no one to receive less than they now receive for a minimum day. The second article referred to yard and switching service, the minimum for eight hours a day to be not less than now paid for ten hours a day, all over eight hours in any twenty-four hours to be paid for at time and a half rates. Article three provided that eight hours or less at the present pay for ten hours will constitute a day for "hostlers," the men who prepare locomotives for runs and care for them at terminals. The final article guaranteed the employees the right to retain any rates of pay or schedules in effect January 1, 1916 which are preferable to the new schedule.

The railroads prepared a statement of their view of the situation in which they said, "To allow the increase would add \$100,000,000 a year to the operating expenses of all the roads of the United States for the benefit of men whose average pay day was increased from 30 to 42 per cent from 1903 to 1914, while the wages of the western engineers were further increased in 1915."

CRACKER JACK IS PLANNING WORK

ASSESSMENTS WILL PROVIDE AMPLE FUNDS FOR DEVELOPMENT WORK

Arrangements are being made to secure an expert geological examination of the property of the Reorganized Cracker Jack Mining company, in order to determine upon a point from which the company will conduct its future operations, which will be conducted upon a liberal and comprehensive scale. The best engineering talent available will be retained for the work of outlining development plans and the actual development work will begin in the near future, with ample funds in hand to carry on the work in a manner best calculated to produce good results, says the Tribune.

Secretary McMahon, who has charge of the company's affairs, reports that stockholders have accorded a prompt and liberal response to the initial call for an assessment of one cent per share and by this means the company will be provided with money to proceed with the active development of its property.

Stockholders of the Adams Goldfield company, the property of which has been taken over by the Cracker Jack, have also been given the opportunity to exchange their stock upon payment of the initial assessment, and many are taking advantage of this privilege. The Cracker Jack property has an excellent surface showing and has produced some good ore from workings near the surface.

LEM ALLEN'S CHEST CRUSHED BY WAGON

Lemuel Allen, former lieutenant-governor of Nevada, was badly hurt on his ranch near Fallon last week and is laid up at his ranch with his chest in a harness. His hay wagon, loaded with two tons of potatoes, turned over on the bank of a ditch and the governor was thrown in front of the wheel. His chest was crushed under the corner of the hay rack. Mr. Allen will have to remain quiet for several weeks.

BAD ROADS DELAY SHIPMENT

Captain W. G. Cotter, president of the Golden Arrow Mining company, is in from the property. He says that the snow is still deep on the Kawliash range and that the road leading to Tonopah is in an abominable condition on account of the storms. He has a considerable accumulation of ore on the dump and is taking out more, but it is impossible to move it until either nature or the county commissioners fix the roads.
