concrete other standards similarly placed (for the volley ball game) should be also fixed and the apparatus is then fairly completed.

But let us consider another condition which seriously affects our progress. Owing to the fact that we have no one who can give whole time to the play activities of our children, the apparatus must be put away and all children sent home just at the time when the playground should be turned over to them for fullest use.

That period of recreation on the play ground apparatus is worse than useless, unless supervised by a physical director. He should be in charge after school until supper, after supper until the curfew and a part, at least of Saturday. And when school closes for the summer, some provision should be made to continue the use of the play ground at stated times.

Now, last but not least, an article in recreation for March can't be complete without a word on kites and kite flying. Kite day in Hawaii is one of the great days. FREE LECTURE AT AIRDOME TONIGHT

PETER COLLINS WILL DISCUSS "WHAT IS WRONG WITH THE WORLD?"

The Airdome will extend a welcome this evening to all who wish to listen to a dispassionate discourse on one of the burning topics of the day. The speaker will be Peter Collins, of Massachusetts, one of the best known industrial reformers and one of the most earnest advocates of popular rights. The subject will be "What's Wrong With the World?" dealing with the questions of Christian Democracy and Socialism. The lecture will be under the auspices of the Knights of Columbus, the only organization in the United States that has taken the field to controvert the heresies of the third party.

All will be welcome. Plenty of seats will be provided. After the speaker completes his discourse he will answer questions submitted by any one on the floor without any preliminary notice or preparation. Mr. Collins has been engaged in this line of work for the past five years, during which he has traveled over 100,000 miles and spoken to millions of people of all races and creeds.

Peter Collins is well equipped for the task he has undertaken as he is one of the best recognized exponents of the demands of labor. He has been an active element in promoting social legislation and his platform work is but the sequel to a lifetime of activity in behalf of the masses. For years he was secretary of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers and served as a member of the Illinois Industrial Commission, one of the first commissions of the kind to suggest a code of laws for the safety and comfort of the working classes. While engaged in that work he succeeded in securing the adoption of various reforms for the betterment of working women. Safeguards in the use of dangerous machinery were rendered compulsory in Illinois despite the efforts of manufacturers to avoid the responsibility and cost of making improvements to conform to the new idea. The law was taken through the lower courts to the Illinois supreme court and then appealed to the U. S. supreme court which upheld all the contentions of the author.

Mr. Collins spoke last evening at Goldfield to a capacity hall and put to rout several speakers who interrupted frequently with an apparent intention of interfering with the program. The lecturer never essayed to parry any of the thrusts leveled at him but replied with the quick action of a rapid fire gun and challenged others to use him for a target. Mr. Collins scored every time and won frequent applause by his quick wit and readiness.

The lecture this evening is free for all.

LOCAL FINN COLONY CELEBRATES WEDDING

MISS ALMA KATAINEN BECOMES THE BRIDE OF MR. KAARL H. LAUKKA

Merriment reigned in the Finlanders' hall on Belmont avenue last evening until early this morning. The occasion was the uniting of two prominent members of the Finnish colony in the bonds of matrimony.

The bride was Miss Alma Katainen and the groom Kaarl H. Luukka, brother of Amos Lucas, who is the acknowledged leader of the colony. Judge Dunseath performed the ceremony, giving it several extra touches and saluting the bride like a cavalier of old, a privilege which was envied him by many of the company.

The ceremony, which took place in the Lucas home, was followed by a sumptuous banquet, served in old country fashion, with wine and music and speeches of congratulation and good wishes. Adornment was then taken to the Finnish hall where dancing was enjoyed until nearly morning, there being about sixty guests present.

One rather amusing, but somewhat disconcerting incident connected with this affair was the fact that Mr. Luukka was to have become naturalized yesterday afternoon and to have assumed the name of Lucas, under which he was to be married, but so frustrated was he by the thought of his impending happiness that he forgot all he had learned about the laws and the constitution and fell down in his examination, for which he had made such careful preparation, so he was compelled to marry as Luukka. He was, however, given two weeks in which to recover and try the examination again, when Judge Averill will doubtless not only give him full citizenship but permit him to Americanize the name of himself and wife.

VALUABLE SHIPMENT FROM NORTH STAR

REPAIRS WILL BE MADE TO THE SHAFT DURING BALANCE OF THIS WEEK

A carload of ore was shipped yesterday from the North Star. It is being settled for today. There is as yet no definite information given out as to the value of the ore, but it is positively known that it is the best shipment that has been made from the property in a long time. The values run high in gold.

Owing to timbers in the shaft having sprung, the hoist will not be operating while repairs are going forward, which may require until Saturday. Meanwhile work will be prosecuted on the 900 intermediate, the miners entering and leaving through the Midway shaft. It was reported today that there had been cessation of work in the Rescue-Eula, but this rumor is positively incorrect. It was confusion of the North Star and Rescue-Eula, both properties being under the same general supervision. The North Star will be in full blast again not later than next Sunday.
