


GOVERNMENT WARNS AGAINST SOME WEATHER FORECASTING FALLACIES

Throughout its history the weather bureau has been called upon from time to time to caution the general public against the too credulous belief in alleged new systems for forecasting the weather for weeks or months in advance...

form of letters, circulars, diagrams, and blue prints, full specifications concerning all essential details of this alleged new system of forecasting. The so-called discovery is fully known to the weather bureau and has received fair and impartial study and examination by its scientific staff. Moreover, other scientists of international reputation now connected with the strongest institutions in the world engaged in astronomical research and conducting investigations in solar and terrestrial physics have also passed upon these new theories.

The latest misrepresentation of this character now being presented to the people of the country in the columns of the daily press is an alleged new system of long-range weather forecasting said to be based on the rifts and spottedness of the sun and its shafts of solar radiation.

When the disk of the sun is minutely examined with powerful telescopes, or when photographed with the aid of the modern spectroheliograph, the surface presents a characteristic spotted appearance which undergoes slight changes from day to day, and greater changes with longer intervals of time, depending upon the well-known rotation of the sun upon its axis and the periodic recurrence of the sunspot maxima and minima.

WHAT NEVADA PAYS FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Carson Appeal says that in 1915 there was nearly \$600,000 expended for the public schools in this state. Of this amount \$232,924.08 was contributed by the state and \$362,561.50 by the counties. The university, according to State Controller Coyle's report, received from the state \$124,153.50 for its support and maintenance, or a grand total of nearly \$720,000 for educational purposes in the State of Nevada.

HUMBOLDT RIVER OVERFLOWS ITS BANKS

The Humboldt river is beginning to respond to the melting snow near its source and is climbing out of banks at a number of places near Battle Mountain. Both the Licking and Starrett meadows are under water as is much of the Land Development ranch. LORD SHACKLETON'S AUXILIARY SHIP DAMAGED ITS JURY RUDDER

WELLINGTON, Mar. 31.—A wireless message from the Aurora, the auxiliary ship of the Lord Shackleton expedition, says: "We are setting toward Snare's Island under the influence of the wind and unable to maneuver the ship. The jury rudder is damaged." A tug was sent to its assistance. Snare's Island is south of New Zealand.

FREIGHT RATES INCREASE

(By Associated Press.) PANAMA, Mar. 31.—Freight rates from the United States to Panama are increasing rapidly, according to merchants here. It is stated that the rate on cement has recently been increased from \$1.20 per barrel to \$1.55, which is more than the value of the cement at the factory. Cement is now selling here at \$3.75 a barrel.

COSTUME APPROVED

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, Mar. 31.—Lord Selborne, head of the war agricultural committee, has approved a model costume for women farm workers, and has undertaken to supply the costume at wholesale prices to local committees. The costume consists of a coat and short skirt of durable washing material, together with gaiters and stout boots. The price of the coat is \$2.50, the skirt \$1.25, and boots \$1.75 and the gaiters \$1.

IRISH FLAX RISES

(By Associated Press.) DUBLIN, Mar. 31.—Irish flax shows a remarkable rise in price. The minimum is now two hundred pounds per ton as against eighty pounds per ton before the war. There has been some extension of flax growing under the advice of the agricultural department. Ireland has provided in the past only a comparatively small part of the flax used in the linen industries of Belfast. The flax used has been largely imported from Belgium and Russia.
