MILITIA FOR THE BORDER

WHAT every one expected has come to pass. The national guards of three states have been ordered to the front to supplement the forces of the regular service on the border. This step is necessary owing to the vast area of country covered by the operations in Mexico and the necessity for maintaining a long line of communication extending for a distance of 300 miles through the heart of a jungle in an enemy country. The boys called to the colors are all western men familiar with the use of firearms and acquainted with the devious ways of the bandits who haunt the banks of the Rio Grande. That they will render a good account of themselves and reflect honor on their respective states goes without saying. By enrolling these troops for border patrol service several thousand regulars will be released from the same police duty they have been doing for the past three years and enable the administration to back up General Pershing with a small, but well trained and seasoned army that should warn the Carranza government that the time for temporizing has passed and there is no further excuse for demanding withdrawal of the American punitive expedition until it's object is accomplished.

This brings the United States face to face with the possibility of an open rupture ending in default intervention unless the Carranzista sense their subtleties and come out boldly with a free co-operation in ridding that country of the guerilla bands that have been preying on frontier settlements of the United States. While the latest raid in Texas is to be deplored it will have a salutary effect on the Obregon, Carranzas and other would be patriots of the disturbed republic to our south. The raid dispels the pretence of Carranza that his troops are capable of taking care of predatory bands and confirms the American representation that, as present organized, there is not much hope of Mexico suppressing disorders.

Texas boasts that one ranger is equal to a hundred Mexicans or even more desperate characters. The faith of the Lone Star state in her mobile police force is invincible and backed by every tradition of the border. The personnel of the rangers is such that each man is a force unto himself, of ready initiative and quick action. In a minor degree the same story applies to the militia of the border. They are recruited from the ranks of men accustomed to the free outdoor life and capable of rustling under all circumstances. The best wishes of the nation will accompany these boys in their arduous and tiresome campaign.

NEGLECT OF PURE FOOD LAWS

IF the University of Nevada wants to do something to earn the praise of residents of Tonopah and the entire southern country President Hendricks should appoint an inspector to look after the food supplies brought into Tonopah and Goldfield from the adjoining states. Some of this stuff is shipped in a green state and carried for long periods before reaching this market where it arrives unfit for human consumption. The pure food law as administered here is a burlesque. Tonopah, with a population of 7,000 is entitled to better service. Instead of spending all the money provided by the legislature on the Reno institution and in Reno it might be well to look after the remainder of the state. There was a time when an inspector was maintained in this city at meager salary but the pittance was not adequate to the duties and scarcely served to cover the cost of transportation. If the district deserves an inspector the salary should be commensurate with the importance of his duties so that he may enforce the law. Consumers are at the mercy of shippers and the shippers are fully aware of the deficiencies of the system so they use the mining camps of southern Nevada for a dumping ground for the offal that cannot be sold in California. It is time for a change. Let the state derive some benefit from the appropriation provided for the purpose of enforcing the pure food law. Reno is not Nevada. That town is an eastern excrescence grafted on the social life of the state and is not deserving of a title of the attention that the real producing sections of Nevada deserve.
