GERMANY ADMITS SINKING OF THE SUSSEX

WEST TONOPAH SHAFT IS READY

ONLY A COUPLE OF NEW SETS NEEDED TO PUT IT IN FIRST CLASS SHAPE

Capt. A. Case, manager of the West Tonopah Mining company, completed the surface improvements at that property yesterday and this morning descended the shaft to make a critical examination. The result was a great surprise. For the entire distance of 850 feet below the collar, the hole was in excellent condition and sinking could be resumed at once if necessary. Not more than a couple of new sets required replacing and, when these are installed, the work of sinking will be carried on with all possible dispatch. The manager says the timbering after eight years is in really better shape than in most working mines of the district and that for the entire distance covering two levels he found nothing to interfere with immediate development of the mine. After the examination the compressor was started to blow out the shaft and remove the stagnant air that had accumulated in the levels during the long period of idleness and tomorrow sinking will be resumed.

HELD FOR RECTIFYING WITHOUT A LICENSE

BULLION SHIPMENTS WORTH OVER \$200,000

BIG OUTPUT FROM EXTENSION AND BELMONT FROM SECOND HALF OF APRIL

For the latter half of April the bullion production of the Tonopah Extension Mining company is valued at \$75,000, in addition to which were shipped concentrates worth \$15,000, making a total of \$90,000.

The Tonopah Belmont Development company has forwarded from its two plants the cleanup for the second half of April. The production by the Tonopah mill was 52 bars, weighing 99,352 ounces, and the output of the Millers plant was 23 bars, weighing 40,933 ounces, making a total of 140,285 ounces. At the present price of silver, with the gold content considered at nearly one third of the silver worth, the bullion, figured at 85 cents an ounce, would be worth \$119,242.25.

Pay Day Puts \$475,000 in Circulation

GERMAN CASUALTIES RUN INTO MILLIONS
