NOBLE ACT OF TONOPAH MAN

HENRY F. CROCKETT OF BERKELEY SACRIFICES HIMSELF FOR COLLEGE CHUM

MARTINEZ, May 18.—Sacrificing his life for his friend and college chum, Albert Keller, with whom he was on a summer vacation of two weeks, Harry F. Crockett, assistant manager of the Berkeley branch of the Oakland Bank of Savings, yesterday went to his death three miles off Martinez when the sloop-yacht Kittiwake capsized.

Italian fishermen in a launch saw the yacht capsize and went to the rescue. They threw the only life preserver they had into the water to aid the two struggling men.

The two boys were members of the University of California Yacht Club and left yesterday for a two weeks vacation up the river in Crockett's yacht.

When opposite Martinez, according to young Keller, a gust of wind capsize their craft and the next moment both men were in the water.

Crockett built the yacht especially for the trip. Two years ago he married Miss Ethel Andrews, who is at present in Los Angeles and has not yet been apprised of the tragedy.

Sheriff's deputies and others are watching the shore near Martinez tonight for young Crockett's body which, it is thought, will come ashore some time within the next twenty-four hours.

Mr. Crockett was assistant cashier of the State Bank and Trust company in Tonopah when that bank occupied the stone building lately vacated by Harry Epstein.
