LAUNDRESSES CANNOT INCREASE CHARGES

BERLIN, May 24.—The heavy hand of increased prices probably has fallen nowhere with greater weight than upon the hundreds of washerwomen of Greater Berlin, who do about 90 per cent of the laundry work of the capital. Soap prices have risen by about 400 per cent, starch by more than 450 per cent, and borax by almost 900 per cent. Yet despite these startling increases, the laundry prices have remained about at their old figure, and cannot be jacked up appreciably, the washerwomen claim. WIRELESS TRAFFIC GAINS BY WAR

MADRID, Spain, May 24.—The traffic of the Spanish International Wireless Telegraph company has increased from an average of 500 words per day before the war to an average of about 6,000 words exclusive of diplomatic correspondence through the monopoly it enjoys in the transmission of wireless messages from abroad.

The Spanish company has two receiving stations, one at Barcelona and the other at Aranjuez near Madrid. They receive French news from the Eiffel Tower and from Lyons, German news from Neuen and Norddeich, British news from London and Carnarvon, Austrian news from Pola and Italian news from Coltano. All the commiques and bulletins from the powers of the entente are printed on yellow paper while those from the central powers and their allies on blue paper. The bulletins are distributed to the press and to other subscribers three times per day, at meal hours.
