

STANDARD OIL GIVES UP CHINA

PULLS UP ITS DRILLS AND ORDERS MEN BACK TO THE UNITED STATES

(By Associated Press.) PEKING, June 5.—The Standard Oil company has withdrawn all its prospectors and equipment from Shensi province and has definitely abandoned the boring of wells in search for oil. The last of its drilling crew has returned to Peking, and will sail for the United States in a few days. While there is still a possibility that the Standard Oil company and the Chinese government may reach an agreement to conduct some further prospecting work some time in the future, there is believed to be little likelihood that such action will be taken soon. No announcement has been made to the success the American company has had in its exploitation work, but it is reported that the results of the drilling were disappointing.

SHOWER BATHS TO PURIFY CARS

REAL PURPOSE IS TO GIVE THE TRAMP PATRONS MUCH-NEEDED WASHING

The Southern Pacific company is evidently going to take no chances with insanitary tramps. Shower baths for freight cars are to be installed at the larger stations of the company within a few days. Plans for these shower bath fixtures have been prepared by T. W. Heinselman, the company's general superintendent of motor power, and yesterday were submitted to headquarters here for approval.

While the company officials insist that the shower baths are to be used for the purpose of testing the waterproof condition of the roofs of freight cars, the impression still lingers in the popular mind that many a weary Raggles is going to receive the surprise of his life soon, and is going to dash out of one of those deluged freight cars a sadder and a cleaner man.

ELKO EXTENDING ITS TOWN SEWER SYSTEM

For the next ninety days 100 men will be actively engaged in carrying out the contract for the improvement and extension of Elko's sewer system. The work is to start at once.

Superintendent L. C. Kelsey, who will have charge of the work, arrived in the city this week to take charge of operations. The extensions and repairs will be carried on simultaneously. All of the sewer pipe south of the railroad will be relaid by putting them in lower to get advantage of more fall for drainage.

About \$30,000 will be spent in the work, which money will be circulated in Elko, which means an additional prosperity for the next ninety days.—Independent.

BUSINESS MEN AND EARNEST REPORTERS

TIMELY AND EFFICIENT ADVICE GIVEN BY WARREN B. BULLOCK OF MILWAUKEE

American merchants and manufacturers have lost great opportunities to advance American business because of their failure to appreciate the pride of American newspaper reporters in their profession," was the declaration of Warren B. Bullock of Milwaukee, when he asked the lumber men to help themselves by helping the newspaper reporters to get the news.

"As an average newspaper man I want to tell you that the poorest newspaper reporter feels that when he goes to interview a business man he is the official representative of the great American public, which is entitled to know the news of the world. By turning away, often with discourtesy, the newspaper reporter who seeks news of the business world, the business man of the country has lost great opportunities, and instead of making friends they have often made enemies. "There are two ways in which this condition can be remedied, rather is being remedied. One is by a more liberal attitude of the business man toward the reporter, the other is by advertising.

"Long years of refusal of business men to give the news to newspaper reporters have built up an attitude often antagonistic, on the part of the newspaper reporters toward the men of business. This habit of years of thinking cannot be overcome in a day. You can help remove this habit of thought, indicated by the use of such terms as 'lumber barons' by a different attitude toward the newspaper reporter. You can help remove the attitude of the public, inculcated through the newspapers, by advertising the character of your business, the second in importance in the nation, by advertising. "People who think the public does not read the advertising columns of

the newspaper are criminally short-sighted—criminal to their own business interests. Probably every one of you lumbermen has given away lumber to build a church. If you made a business of giving away your stock in trade, how long would you last? And yet that is what is expected of a newspaper, to boost in its news columns, when his stock in trade is his advertising columns. It is not a present when you place an advertising contract. You are buying the best bargain that you can get in the world of business.

"Courtesy to a newspaper reporter is the other of the good investments you can make. Treat the reporter as a co-worker, not as an offensive intruder. The newspaper wants news. If you have news, give it out, and give it out right. You will never get the 'worst of it if you follow this policy.'"
