HUGHES IS THE MAN

ROOSEVELT DECLINES THE NOMINATION IF HUGHES IS DEEMED SATISFACTORY

STANDARD BEARER WIRES HIS ACCEPTANCE ROOSEVELT BREAKS SILENCE WITH A WIRE

Conference Committee on Settling Differences Still Open For a Final Report, and it is Believed That the Names of Roosevelt and Johnson Will Be Withdrawn Later.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Justice Hughes has telegraphed Chairman Harding accepting the nomination.

CHICAGO, June 10.—Justice Charles Evans Hughes was nominated on the third ballot by a vote that was virtually unanimous.

The nomination was made virtually at the same time that Roosevelt was named by the Progressives unanimously.

Fairbanks, notwithstanding his request that his name be withdrawn was nominated on the first ballot for vice-president.

When it became apparent that Roosevelt was overwhelmingly defeated his name was withdrawn which caused several states to change their votes to Hughes.

It was everywhere considered a landslide for Hughes. The convention adjourned at 2 o'clock.

The moment when it was flashed to the Progressive convention that Hughes had been nominated by the Republicans, Robins was announcing to the cheering Progressives that Roosevelt had been chosen by acclamation for their standard bearer.

The reading of a letter from Roosevelt which referred to a statement issued mentioned Lodge as a compromise had no influence on the delegates who were determined on the name of Roosevelt and no other.

Throughout the convention it was noticed that the Progressives had little sympathy with the movement of the leaders to reach a peace agreement with the Republicans, but were determined to have Roosevelt.
