GLASGOW & WESTERN HOLDINGS ARE SOLD

COMPANY WAS CONTROLLED BY MILLIONAIRE ENGLISH THREAD MAKERS

Affairs of the Glasgow and Western Exploration company, limited, are gradually nearing a point of liquidation and Joseph Ralph, liquidator for the company, expects to soon dispose of all the property, most of which is now under bond and lease. This British concern was backed to the extent of \$5,000,000 by Peter Coats and his brother, Archibald Coats, of the thread concern of that name. Two years ago Peter Coats sent Mr. Ralph from London to clean up the affairs of the company. He found that the former managers had spent the money and left the concern with three undeveloped properties.

It was decided that the properties be sold, with the exception of the Montreal group of claims in Beaver county, Utah, which would be developed. While the preliminary work on this was in progress, Peter Coats died, and as his brother had died several years before, the estate decided to close out all the properties.

The Copper canyon ground, near Golconda, Nev., has been turned over through Fred A. Flindt of Salt Lake to interests allied with Hayden, Stone and company. F. S. Schmidt of Salt Lake has been placed in charge as general manager and W. Campbell, a Park miner, is superintendent. The shaft, which has been under water to the 420 level since 1881, is being unwatered. At the same time, the new waters are shipping from the old tailings dump.

The Copper basin property, near Battle Mountain, Nev., is under bond and lease to Frank Paul of Los Angeles, who was the first man to bring Elly to the attention of eastern people. Work will be started here at once.

The Montreal property has been under bond and lease for several months to John Cowan, B. Binard and Al Frank of Salt Lake. Shipment is being made to the local smelter from a big copper surface deposit. Salt Lake Telegram.

DRILLING RULES FOR JULY FOURTH

The rules to govern the Fourth of July drilling contest provide that the contest be open to miners of Nye, Esmeralda and Mineral counties. Miners must have resided in one of said counties at least 30 days prior to July 4th, 1916. Team must enter and pay entrance fee of \$12.50 on or before July 3rd, 1916, 7 o'clock p. m. to W. B. Evans.

Drawing for place will take place at the chief of police office at 7 o'clock p. m. July 3rd, 1916. The purse of \$1,000 will be divided as follows: 1st prize, \$500, 2nd prize \$300, 3rd prize \$200.

The third prize will be given only when five teams have drilled, otherwise the 3rd prize of \$200 to be placed back in the Fourth of July general fund.

Time of contest fifteen (15) minutes. Steel to measure 7-8 in full size. No swaged bits allowed. Any style hammer to be used, but not to weigh over 8 lbs. In changing two blows are allowed from each hammer. Each team is allowed a coach and a private time keeper, but the time of the official time keeper shall govern the contest.

INSPECTING GAS AT LOCAL GARAGES

STATE OFFICIAL REPORTS ON QUALITY OF GASOLINE SOLD IN TONOPAH

S. C. Dinsmore, state pure food and weights and measures inspector, returned to Reno by way of Goldfield this morning after spending a couple of days in Tonopah examining the supply of gasoline and the quality of milk sold here. The Tonopah Auto Supply company and Lundlee Brothers were found in excellent shape with the quality of their gas scoring 59 per cent which is not inferior for the present time and is considered equal to the best that can be had on the coast. The measuring test also found these firms up to the standard.

Samples of milk and cream were taken and these were found equally satisfactory. In the grocery stores samples of butter were weighed with the result that all were found of full weight. Last year when Mr. Dinsmore visited the camp he discovered that most of the butter, which came from Inyo county, was several ounces shy to the pound.

The latest commodity to suffer from adulteration is vinegar and Mr. Dinsmore recommends that householders buy their vinegar in sealed bottles as most of the bulk goods sold here is subject to adulteration. The bottled goods cost no more and the label is a guarantee of freedom from impurities. Most of the bulk vinegar brought in is of more than maximum strength to save freight as the jobbers then adulterate it with water to the extent of 100 per cent and reduce the acetic acid contents below the minimum required by law. Pure food requirements call for 4 per cent acetic acid.

A case of what was alleged to be cyanide poisoning near Yerington wherein the victim was a young beefeater engaged the attention of the department, but the tests failed to substantiate the theory. It is presumed that the young cow indulged in a banquet of a noxious weed and then kicked off.
