FIFTEENTH ANNIVERSARY

THE TONOPAH BONANZA has a birthday today and is justly proud of the fact that it has pioneered the way through Southern Nevada for tens of thousands of pilgrims who came in stages and varnished coaches in the exciting years following the discoveries of Jim Butler on the site of the present Mizpah mine. Today is the beginning of Volume XVI. The Bonanza started as a weekly, which it continued to issue until March 24, 1906, when the paper graduated and appeared as a full-fledged daily. On that date the opening paragraph of the salutatory contained the following statement:

In making its initial appearance The Tonopah Daily Bonanza desires to express the hope that it will serve a useful purpose and will attain for itself in the community a position worthy of the most fastidious. No trouble or care will be spared in the preparation of a sheet that will be a newspaper in every sense of the word.

Every promise contained in that paragraph has been redeemed. The Bonanza has continued under one management during the full period of its existence—fifteen years—and never missed an issue, in spite of assaults by fire and dynamite. Every business day for the past nine years the daily has been delivered at the doors of subscribers with the latest Associated Press news, and its local columns have always been the authentic chronicle of the happenings of the camp. The Bonanza blazed the way and built trails for the men who would like to see the editor behind prison bars or occupying a felon's cell, but the fact that the people have vindicated the management at all times as the free exponent of public sentiment proves beyond doubt that no muzzling or intimidation can throttle free speech or a free press. During every hour from birth this paper has been under the direct personal control of the present manager and editor, and no influence, no matter how powerful, has succeeded in suppressing the truth or garbling the facts.

BLOODSTAINED EXPORTS

DEMOCRATIC orators fulminating jeremiads on the St. Louis rostrum dwell freely on the increase in the export business of the country compared with the previous administration of President Taft under a Republican tariff, but they fail to essay an analysis of this recently developed business, which would not be so creditable to the nation, which is profiting from the sufferings of others. The Democratic speakers would have it appear that all the new business has been built up through some uncanny sense of business possessed by the men who control the administration. They say they have gone fourth and slain the trusts, but they fail to add that the trusts are flourishing today as they never flourished before. It does not require a soothsayer to find the secret of this astonishing ability to expand when the chief competitors of the United States are either blockaded to an extent that debar them from entering the world's markets or the fact that their home requirements are all absorbed by the war game. There is no denying this. The facts given in the last circular issued by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce of the Department of Commerce, which announces that for the ten months of the fiscal year the United States has exported \$3,395,382,107 worth of merchandise, manufactures and commodities, compared with \$2,225,823,782 for the same period ending April 1, 1915. A closer study of the table discloses the appalling prosperity which is tinged with the blood of human beings and stained with the sordid incentive of getting business at any cost, regardless of the moral of the investment. The principal gains may be summed up as follows:

Brag of this, if you may; the Republican party wants none of it.

This Mexican situation is becoming too much of a farce for the Wilson administration, which takes the public into its confidence to the extent of predicting that the troubles have advanced far enough for some grave reprisal by the United States. While the Democratic convention is in session Secretary of State Lansing prefers not to be quoted, but he borrows the ear of a correspondent to remark that, after the St. Louis gathering disperses, something will be done to bring Carranza to his senses. The most ladylike punishment that could be meted out to the arch brigand of the neighboring

It is strange that Mr. Lansing should be inveigled into making a statement at this time, in view of the fact that he is so modest that he does not want the world to think he is playing politics in the interest of his big chief. Such a thing is past comprehension. Of course Wilson knew nothing of his subordinate daring to give out an official statement involving any chastisement of Mexico and it was real mean for Lansing to venture an opinion at this critical time when his party cannot muster another candidate for the presidency. Wilson is the essence of conscientious dealing, but his hairsplitting methods do not comport with his treatment of matters across the border.

AN UNEXPLAINED PLANK

PERHAPS Mr. Wilson can explain his present course, in view of the fact that, through his instrumentality, the last National Democratic convention inserted the following plank in the platform, at Baltimore:
