RENO PIONEER DIES AT PLUMAS RANCH

FOUND DEAD ON BANK OF CREEK, SUPPOSEDLY FROM HEART DISEASE

Sudden death claimed Edwin Ferris, chairman of the board of county commissioners and one of the pioneers of the state, some time Tuesday afternoon on his ranch in Plumas county, Cal. His dead body was found on the bank of a creek late Tuesday evening. It is presumed that heart failure was the cause of death, says the Reno Gazette of Wednesday.

Mr. Ferris went to his ranch last Friday on one of his periodical trips. He had not been feeling well for some time, complaining of pains in his stomach for several days prior to his departure.

"Ed" Ferris, as he was commonly known, was one of the most familiar figures in the history of Nevada and was known all over the state and northern California. He crossed the plains in 1864, being a member of one of the largest emigrant parties to make the trip in the early days. He settled in Plumas and Lassen counties, Cal., and leaves large estates in those counties. His Plumas county ranch consists of 1600 acres and he owned 700 acres in Lassen county. He was largely identified with the stock and dairy industries in both counties.

TUNGSTEN IS RECOGNIZED AS LEGAL TENDER
