THE MAN BEHIND THE GUN

"THE time has come," remarked President Wilson the other day in referring to the Mexican situation. He then went on to elaborate the fact that the time had come for action and hinted darkly that something was likely to happen. Well, what is the matter? Nobody has any strings on the administration, if the public is to believe one title of what has been launched by fervid orators at St. Louis. The President stands behind the guns and it is up to him to act. If the "time has come" then why not act and act at once, without waiting for more Americans to be massacred on the border of Mexico. He is doing the driving, and if there is any delay or waiting it is up to him to explain instead of eternally threatening something. Shoot, and shoot at once.

SILENT ABOUT SHIPBUILDING

IT IS remarkable how quiet the administration can be when there is a gap to bridge or a dilemma to avoid. The subject of shipbuilding is carefully avoided in the forecasting speech of the permanent chairman of the Democratic convention as a subject that is too delicate to tackle. The eloquent jurist from New Jersey indulges in apostrophes to the American flag, but retreats within his shell when it comes to explaining why the flag has been wiped off the sea and why, even today, with the backing of the administration, the number of transfers from American registers to foreign owners is steadily increasing. Down in Massachusetts the fishermen are protesting against concessions granted the government of Newfoundland by which American fishers are excluded from the most profitable fishing grounds on the Atlantic coast. The evil is so aggravated that the fastest and finest schooners owned in Marblehead have passed over to British registers.

MINERAL COUNTY DEVELOPMENT

AT LAST Mineral county has won the heritage for which it has striven mapfully ever since that county was erected out of the western end of Esmeralda county. From every side nothing but the ring of hammer, the buzz of saw and the echo of explosives are heard, indicating an activity such as has not been observed since the lamentable days of Rawhide. There is no analogy between the present-day movement and the fevered rush of 1908. One was founded by the most ferocious wildcats that ever unsheathed a claw, while the present is based on the positive production of mineral that has gone ahead of the population and facilities for taking care of it. There is no desire to create a boom, which the Western Nevada Miner fervently hopes will not come into the prosperous precincts of Mineral county. The boom, as commonly applied, refers to artificial conditions and fictitious values that do not find any counterpart in either Sodaville, Luning or Mina. These communities are flourishing on the strength of tonnage that cannot be disputed or discounted. Reports of the Southern Pacific predict that within the next six months that railroad will haul out of Luning alone over 9000 tons of copper ore. This does not take into account the newly arrived shipments from tributary camps on the narrow gauge, which send all their loads to Mina to be transferred to broad-gauge cars, nor does it take into consideration the output of the tungsten camp at Sodaville.

The cold truth is that the facts about this wonderful development of Mineral county have not been understood by the people at large of this state. The mines are the sum and substance of the Luning county and the chief cry of the managers is that there is not sufficient means for handling the ore in sight. The producers are young. The camp is still in its infancy, but it has the mineral that will eventually mean the establishing of a smelter or reduction plant on the ground, right at the door of the mines. There is no escape from that conclusion. When this day arrives it will not be surprising to find Luning grow into a second Ely. The main argument against the treatment of this Mineral county center as a boom camp is the absence of the wily promoter, the conspicuous isolation of the brokerage element and the further fact that there is not a single one of the companies of the district engaged in speculation. They are all busy getting out ore or blocking out reserves that will bring returns of a substantial nature in the near future. It is a busy, practical man's camp where the hooster is not found on the sidewalks barking his head off. The saloon miner is not there. Neither is the man with a wad of pretty certificates waiting to waylay the new arrival. The latter has only to protect himself from energetic managers who are likely to shanghai him and impress him into their service to hurry the extraction of ore. Yes, it is a busy man's camp—a miners' camp, the habitat of the real mining business where a man is gauged by his desire to work and where a premium is placed on industrial talent.

Luning was picked out by Giroux as the best copper location in Nevada. This was after the full value of Ely was discovered, and Giroux knew more about Ely and its resources than any other man. Giroux was a wizard when it came to scenting out the red metal and he was one of the first to make locations in the Luning district ten years ago. He succeeded in organizing a powerful company to prosecute work when the panic came and the capitalists whom he had interested withdrew after they had been notified by their bankers that ready money could not be had for any sort of new enterprise and that checks would only be honored with clearing house certificates. That set Luning back for just ten years. In the meantime the men with locations stuck manfully to their claims and now are in a position to enter into their just reward.

Under such circumstances there cannot be any boom in Mineral county, especially in Luning, for there are more buyers than sellers and more jobs than applicants.

Of Sodaville it is almost superfluous to say anything. When a concern of world-wide reputation like that of Atkins-Kroll company assumes responsibility for operating a mine and constructing a big

mill it is certain that both propositions have merit. Should anyone essay to disparage the investment the request is made that some attention be given the payroll of the Sodaville company, which carries between 160 and 200 men. No, dear reader, there is no boom in Mineral county.

Well, the agony is over and the same old ticket is in the field with the same old repudiated principles in the repudiated platform forming the hurricane deck of the Democratic ship of state. Nothing remains to be said until the seventh day of November, when the electors will be heard from in a way that will not be misunderstood.

Not satisfied with regrets over the withdrawal of Roosevelt, the Democrats are trying to convince the country that he is a very sick man whose usefulness during the campaign will not be felt. We'll see what we'll see. Wait.
