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"DEATH AT THE FIRESIDE"

THE address of the permanent chairman of the Democratic convention referred to the dilatory action of the president as an excuse for not "seating death at the fireside" in many American homes. The speaker indulged in a liberal description of the bloodshed which this country is supposed to have avoided by an effeminate assumption of diplomacy, but he failed to drive home the moral of the story that the national honor had been prostituted for sordid ends. He descants on the hundreds of millions of such a war would have cost and dwells at great length on the subject of taxation surely to follow in the train of the war specter. The latter thought must have made a deeper impression on the spokesman of his party than the fact that scores of Americans were actually killed, property destroyed and millions in values given to the flames while the great nation across the border was temporizing and finding excuses for its inactivity. The silver tongued spellbinder from New Jersey declared any hostile action "would have destroyed our prosperity." Such talk is not becoming to the oracle of a national party representing some millions of American voters. It is shameful that such sordid questions as money and taxation should be coupled with thought of national honor and integrity.

This aggravates the disgrace for it reduces Columbia to the level of the strumpet who bargains her soul under the pretext that it is done to avert starvation. The language of the man from New Jersey is the same plea in grandiloquent terms. Nothing more and nothing less. The American people shrink from protecting their honor for the sake of a few miserable dollars. The argument is a dollars and cents proposition devoid of sense or morality. The street walker solicits patronage through the sacrifice of the priceless endowment of womanhood and the Democratic party stands pilloried as the denaturalized faction of a people who have heretofore stood for all that was noble and grand in the ideals of statehood.

The same weak argument is advanced for not asserting the rights of the nation in European negotiations that have paltered along with unsteady steps and feeble whining until it seems as though the leaders of the belligerent nations were taking pity on the dawdling and incoherent efforts of the Wilson administration to grant slight concessions as an excuse for terminating the correspondence that has gone on until it assumes the formidable shape of an endless chain.

What is needed at Washington is a man with red blood, a man of the people and a statesman who thinks of something loftier than a cowardly evasion of the real issue.

FUTURE OF SILVER

THE Toronto World is a persistent advocate of the remonetization of silver and an earnest apostle of silver industry, which it predicts will see brighter days on the close of hostilities in Europe. Quoting the circular of a firm of bullion dealers in London the Globe states: "Coinage demands have again been active and there have been some resales on the part of Indian bazars and elsewhere. The market is now swept clear of such offerings. Quotations of silver are suspended owing to the uncertainty which attaches to the price of the metal." The writer predicts that the experience of the copper stocks will be duplicated with the silvers. The coppers scored phenomenal gains when the quotation for the metal rose from 14 to 30 cents a pound. The editor says the advance in silver is expected to eclipse, in proportion, the rise in copper and as yet the silver stocks have done little to discount this. The public only became buyers of copper stocks after a tremendous advance and appear willing to adopt the same course in silver shares. The following table represents the influence of the buying movement on coppers which is likely to be duplicated with the silvers. The comparison follows:

"The American public is becoming more interested in silver securities as was evidenced by the subscriptions to the Adana flotation at 50c a share and which was eagerly bought yesterday as high as 57c. The purchasing public has pretty well tired of the high priced stocks in which margins are frequently wiped out over night and are beginning to speculate and invest in silver and gold shares which offer larger speculation chances and with much less risk. New York brokers are commencing to cater to this new field and special wires are now in service for this purpose between Toronto, New York, Philadelphia, Boston and Chicago. The awakening in silver is stimulating the gold stocks and yesterday McIntyre was bought at a good advance. McIntyre will shortly be producing from \$60,000 to \$65,000 net a month and will be the next Porcupine dividend payer."

AMERICA THE DUMPING GROUND

THE United States Department of Commerce reports through its agent at London that British manufacturers are planning a grand coup to capture the American market. These men do not appear frightened by thought of continuing the war for they are actuated by the one motive that it is imperative that the export trade of Great Britain should increase. That seems to be the tenor of all commercial conferences held by the warring powers. They all realize that the only way to pay their war debts and to rehabilitate themselves is to develop their maximum powers of production. This means the attainment of a lower unit of cost of production and the ability to flood the American market with goods manufactured at exceedingly low labor costs.

This is the direct result of the invitation of the Democratic party

to make the United States the dumping ground of creation. With the abolition of the protective tariff the United States urges former competitors to come forward and supply American consumers with goods that cannot be sold at home and at sacrifice prices that will close most factories that now owe their existence to war contracts. The real danger after the war is that the foreign manufacturer will not sell goods in this market at less than the actual cost of production, but they will sell goods below our own cost at home. With a Democratic free trade law on the statute books this country will be in a bad position shortly after peace is proclaimed unless the Republican party is restored to power and the tariff fence is replaced where it belongs. The protective tariff has stood for more enduring prosperity than the allurements of munitions manufacture and unless it is restored the future will be dark for the wage earner and the man with his money invested in industrials.

The frequency in which the name of the Deity was invoked by Democratic speakers at St. Louis, suggests the party is making peace with the Maker preparatory for the final plunge of the stage.

The President is to march on foot for preparedness. His party in Congress seems to be crawling on hands and knees toward the same goal.—Pittsburgh Dispatch.
