Taking as a basis the price of other Tonopah stocks and the physical condition of the properties represented by these stocks, they are selling proportionately higher than the Rescue. My school has been the mines of Virginia City, where I spent years underground, and that experience gives me a certain amount of knowledge which has the same weight in Tonopah, because I feel the formation and the ore deposition are the same.

SHALLOW WORKING TURNS UP 21 PER CENT SPECIMENS ON NEW MIAMI PROSPECT

Ore has been struck at 15 feet which, assayed by the Old Dominion smelter chemist, gave returns of 21 and 22 per cent copper, according to a wire received by S. J. Michelson yesterday from H. C. Malloy, of the Inspiration, Needles, says the Arizona Republican.

The first drill in operation on the property of the Inspiration Needles Copper company at Miami is in ore, is the report brought to Phoenix last night by Louis Kronthal, a recent arrival from Miami.

The Inspiration Needles company has purchased four additional drills, which Supt. Malloy is moving on the grounds, and three eight-hour shifts are now being worked on the property. This action is causing no little excitement in the Gobe-Miami district and the Inspiration Needles is opening up what the most prominent mining men consider a bonanza copper mine in Arizona.

John S. Cook, the Globe banker and capitalist, is now in New York City making preparations for listing Inspiration Needles on the New York and Boston curbs, and it is rumored in mining circles that Charles M. Schwab, former president of the steel trust, is interested in the new company.

Mr. Kronthal states that the Inspiration Consolidated Copper company will produce twenty-two million dollars' worth of bullion for the ensuing year at the present rate of production. This is seven million dollars more than the cost of their property, which includes the largest concentrator in the world.
