PREPAREDNESS IS LOCAL WATCHWORD

By Wm. McClure Gotwaldt Preparedness is the watchword of Tonopah today. There was a time when tonnage heads and dividends were the chief considerations, when leads were stripped with feverish haste and the one great aim seemed to be the acquisition of sudden wealth for the shareholders.

In those days the merry riot did not seem to consider the cost of freighting 65 miles to a narrow gauge railroad and did not take into serious recognition the fact that high grade is chiefly good for "sweetening."

At this juncture let it be stated by an old timer, who has paid well for his little knowledge, that nothing will kill a mine quicker than a meteoric campaign directed against the specimen rock. In the first place, this pay crack doesn't last always. It is like picking the raisins out of the pudding and then going back for the low grade. The latter doesn't prove very palpable by comparison.

Then, in the second place, the railroad companies, not being eleemosynary institutions, have a sliding scale for ores, based on valuations, and it is so arranged that they put such a tax on the high running stuff that they don't care whether they handle the low grade or not. The ore reduction companies have progressed along similar lines.

No More Waste There was haste in the early days, and it was attended by waste. This meant gutted workings, filled in with waste, which had later to be expensively and painstakingly removed. It doesn't pay to handle rock two or three times, if one operation can be made to suffice.

These were the days before General Efficiency took command of the forces in Tonopah, before method corrected madness, before the "overhead" was subjected to scientific pruning. Economy Prevails.

In these latter days the cost of shipment has been eliminated. The transit from mine to mill is accomplished with the minimum of expense. Economies prevail in the mines. The

WINTER WHEAT GAIN FORECAST FOR STATE

WASHINGTON, July 8.—A summary of the July crop report for Nevada, as compiled by the bureau of crop estimates, is as follows: Winter wheat: July 1 forecast, 656,000 bushels; production last year, 572,000 bushels. Spring wheat: July 1 forecast, 1,088,000 bushels; production last year, 576,000 bushels. Oats: July 1 forecast, 579,000 bushels; production last year, 585,000 bushels. Barley: July 1 forecast, 454,000 bushels; production last year, 576,000 bushels. Potatoes: July 1 forecast, 2,140,000 bushels; production last year, 2,236,000 bushels. Hay: July 1 condition 80, compared with the eight year average of 94. Pasture: July 1 condition, 82, compared with the ten year average of 96. Apples: July 1 forecast, 17,000 barrels; production last year, 40,000 barrels. Prices: The first price given below is the average on July 1 this year, and the second the average on July 1 last year: Wheat, \$1.20 and \$1.66 per bushel; oats, 85c and 75c; potatoes, \$1.13 and \$1.40; hay, \$9.30 and \$8 per ton; eggs, 27c and 25c per dozen.
