THE REPUBLICAN COUNTY CENTRAL COMMITTEE IS WELL REPRESENTED

The Republican County Central Committee met last evening in the office of Grant Crumley with an enthusiastic attendance that was further emphasized by the presence of several of the leaders from the southern end of the county. A number of prospective candidates appeared and discussed the situation and the prospects of the campaign. The outside precincts were represented by W. R. Gibson and W. L. Gombo, of Round Mountain; E. Palmer, of Beatty, and Ed. Bevis, of Rhyolite. Each of these gentlemen spoke warmly of the interest taken in county affairs, especially since they all had good cause for complaint in the matter of the distribution of road funds. In the vicinity of Rhyolite more work is going on than for years, yet the amount of money spent on the roads

is nominal and the chief companies that are trying to revive the languishing industries of the Bullfrog district have to do their own road work while trying to add to the assessed valuation of the county. The same complaint comes from Round Mountain, which has received little or no benefit from the road tax. It was resolved to call a mass meeting on August 7 for the purpose of bringing voters together and instructing them how to cast their votes at the primaries. The Airdome has been selected as the only place with sufficient capacity to accommodate the voters and it was announced that the program would bring out some of the best speakers of the state, as it would be the first demonstration of party strength in the past four years.

HEAVY TONNAGE GOES TO BOTTOM

INCLUDING ALL CAPTURES OF CENTRAL POWERS 2,000,000 TONS ARE SUNK (By Associated Press.) BERLIN, August 1.—Forty-nine warships with an aggregate tonnage of 562,000 were lost by the entente allies, according to statistics given out by the German admiralty. The British lost forty. The losses to Teutonic allies were given as 30 warships of 162,000 tons. Merchant ships sunk by Teutonic allies total 1303 tons, with an aggregate tonnage of 2,000,000.

KAISER SAYS HE CAN'T HELP POLAND

BLOCKADE PREVENTS RENDERING HELP TO STARVING IN POLAND (By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, August 1.—Gen. many informs the United States that she has refused "on account of the impracticable conditions imposed by Great Britain upon shipments of food-stuffs from America into Poland," to enter into further negotiations for co-operations in the Poland relief work, which would be devoid of purpose. Owing to favorable crop prospects, the imperial government says, relief will be unnecessary after the first of October. Later the spar barricade was replaced outside the line of covered barges which screen the Deutschland from view from the river. It is known the vessel expected to depart at high tide this afternoon. Owing to a strong adverse wind the flood stage was not as high as required by the Deutschland, necessitating postponement. The next high tide will be between 7 and 9 o'clock this evening.

ARBITRATION FOR RAILROADS

LOS ANGELES JOBBERS URGE ACTION TO AVERT STRIKE (By Associated Press.) LOS ANGELES, August 1.—The Association of Jobbers sent a letter to every civic organization in California today asking for the adoption of a resolution urging the Railroad commission to attempt to avert the threatened strike of 350,000 railroad employes of the country through arbitration. Attention is called to the earlier action of the Arizona, Nevada and New Mexican commissions appealing to the men to accept arbitration.

GREAT CLOUDBURST NEAR GOODSPRINGS

MINING TOWN JUST ESCAPES; DAMAGE TO ROADS AND MINE RAILROAD Goodsprings witnessed a mighty cloudburst on Thursday which sent a huge wall of water rolling down from Potosi mountain, passing the town just to the east, says the Clark County Review. Had the flood taken a slightly different course and struck the town there would have been nothing left of the famous zinc-lead center. The wagon and auto roads from Goodsprings to Jean are almost totally destroyed. Auto travel is impossible. All the roads in the district are badly washed and the Yellow Pine narrow gauge railroad is washed out in half a dozen places. It is stated that the Jean-Goodsprings road can be soon temporarily repaired, but it will require a vast amount of work to place the roads to the various mines in condition for hauling ore. The disaster will be a severe blow to the mining town, whose prosperity depends entirely on the shipping of ore.

WESTERN GUARDS ON BORDER WELL HOUSED

EXAMINATION SHOWS CITIZEN SOLDIERS ARE DOING VERY SATISFACTORILY (By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, August 1.—Major General Bliss completed inspection of the National Guard troops on the border today with the examination of the camps of California, Connecticut, Idaho and Utah contingents posted in the region of Nogales, which are reported generally satisfactory.

BRITISH STEAMER IS SUNK IN PACIFIC

(By Associated Press.) VALPARAISO, August 1.—The British steamer Ecuador was lost off Point Llico as the result of a boiler explosion. Many lives were lost. The other passengers were rescued by the steamers Coral and Porteno.

GERMAN ESTIMATE OF ANGLO-FRENCH LOSSES

(By Associated Press.) BERLIN, August 1.—According to a cautious estimation the total Anglo-French losses in the Somme offensive will reach 350,000 officers and men.

BUILDING UP THE SOUTHERN COUNTRY

AMARGOSA VALLEY IS MAKING SPLENDID SHOWING WITH SMALL FARMS

E. E. Palmer, of Rhyolite, who is engaged in general merchandising and ranching in the Beatty country, is a visitor to Tonopah. He is an optimist of the go ahead order and he predicts that the day is not far distant when the Amargosa valley will be the scene of intense cultivation to an extent that will supply the camps of the county with all the small fruits and vegetables required. The line of waving alfalfa has steadily spread from a small fringe on the banks of the Amargosa back to the hills where water can be carried for irrigation without expensive pumping plants. "The valley is from one to four miles wide as at present cultivated," explained Mr. Palmer, "but with capital there is no reason why the reclamation should not extend for the full distance of forty miles where the ground is good and all that is needed is water, which must be furnished by capital. The Bull Moose is doing splendid work, employing between 25 and 30 men exploring the hill, which seems to be a massive quarry of low grade gold ore capable of lasting for years to come. The people down in our end of the country believe the Belmont will install a large milling plant that will mark a new era in the mining life of Rhyolite. At the marble quarry the new finishing plant is about completed and the company, which consists of Ohio capital, will enter on the productive stage. As proof of what may be done by attention to business I will mention the case of L. P. Kimball, who was one of the first to advocate ranching on the Amargosa, who shipped a carload of prime fed finished steers to the Salt Lake market this week. The beef is the finest I ever saw and Kimball expects to get top prices."

MILLION DOLLARS' WORTH OF PAPER IN STOCK WHILE PRICES SOAR

WASHINGTON, August 1.—At a hearing by the Federal Trade commission on the high prices of news print paper it was charged that the International Paper company is holding a million dollars' worth of news print paper; that publishers are facing increased prices with prospects of being unable to make new contracts. A representative of the paper company declared the stock was held to sustain the company's record of never having failed to supply customers, no matter what happened.
