PIOCHE THRILLED BY FIVE ACCIDENTS

SOUNDS LIKE MOTION PICTURE STUNT STAGED IN SLEEPY HOLLOW

August started out with exciting incidents for Pioche. The show started at noon last Tuesday when William Culverwell, accompanied by Mrs. Hennie Wilcox and Lew Gillispie, backed off an embankment near the courthouse. Gillispie suffered a broken collar bone and bruises. Later in the day Harry L. Parker was knocked unconscious by a rock hurled by the wheel of his machine, causing the car to turn turtle. B. I. Christensen managed to crawl from the wreckage and bring Parker to his senses. Both men sustained slight injuries.

A pair of horses belonging to Hodges-Cook mercantile company became frightened by the sound of an iron hoop and ran away, resulting in one smash up at the corner of Lacour street. A box of matches took fire, which was communicated to a can of gasoline. Beside the gasoline 500 pounds of dynamite reposed. Men, women and children ran in every direction. However, a fire hose was stretched and the blaze put out before the powder exploded.

During the day a miner working in the Prince Con mine had one foot mashed. In the evening a furious thunderstorm prevailed in the vicinity of the Delmeo ranch and a bolt of lightning killed a valuable cow. This ended one of the most eventful days that Pioche ever experienced.

BOXING CONTESTS ARRANGED FOR AIRDOME NEXT WEEK

Gus Rainier, successful fight promoter of Goldfield, has been appointed matchmaker of the Business Men's Athletic club and is to stage several high class boxing contests at the Airdome on Tuesday evening, August 15. The program lined up will prove to be the most attractive and evenly matched card arranged here in many months.

The main bout of the evening will be furnished by Johnny McCarthy and Bob Graham, of Goldfield. Both men have an unusually large number of friends and are well liked here and in Goldfield. They have never met in the squared circle and should put up a very interesting battle, as both are of the stand up type of boxers. They will weigh in at 158 pounds at 5 o'clock, which is giving the gold camp's favorite a shade the best of it.

The semi-windup will bring together two of the classiest lightweights in the game today when Paddy O'Hern, a Montana lightweight, meets Tommy McKeivitt, of Seattle. The latter has never appeared anywhere in Nevada, but possesses a record long enough to entitle him to a crack at the top-notchers of the lightweight class anywhere in the world. O'Hern has been tried out in Goldfield and demonstrated in his last bout that he is a hard proposition for any man to tackle.

MORE WATER FOR NEXT YEAR IS PROMISED

Louis D. Gordon, president of the Round Mountain Mining company, was in Tonopah yesterday on his return from a visit to the property and continued on to his home in San Francisco. He said to the Bonanza: "The water season is nearing an end. The snow disappeared earlier than was anticipated. Our costs this year were lower than during any season since hydraulic mining was inaugurated in the Round Mountain mining district.

"Most of the dirt was of lower grade than last year, but we passed through the lean zone and now we are treating an excellent grade of gravel. Even with the setback of the lean zone the general situation is better than ever for the company. Our original estimate of yardage and values will be realized and probably exceeded.

"A complete statement covering all of our hydraulic operations is now being prepared and should be ready for distribution inside of ten days. This statement will also cover certain features of the lode mine hitherto unknown to the public.

"We are now making plans to increase our water supply next season by opening certain springs on the Jefferson-Shoshone watershed and laying flow lines to our present intakes. We also contemplate increasing the storage capacity of our Jett canyon dam.

"We have opened some new ore in the Los Gazabo vein about 200 feet east of our present working shaft. This is the first ore opened in the vein so far east of the shaft and the find is considered to be of great importance."
